



Better Dressed at a Lower Cost



TAXPAYERS have been saved about \$2 billion dollars annually through legislation which has included recommendations of the nonpartisan Hoover Commission. Many of the most important bills remain, however, to be passed before the 82nd Congress. These include: (1) modern personnel management methods; (2) better service for veterans; (3) unified Federal hospitals; (4) a modernized Post Office; (5) a check on "pork barrel" public works; (6) an up-to-date Agriculture Department.
