NOTICE OF ANNUAL ELECTION
Deerfield-Shields Township High School District No. 113, Lake County, Illinois

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on Saturday, the 14th day of April, an election will be held in and for the Deerfield-Shields Township High School District No. 113, Lake County, Illinois, for the purpose of electing a member of the Township High School Board of Education, to serve for three years.

The said District for the purpose of said election, is divided into four precincts as follows:

PRECINCT NUMBER 1

All that part of said District lying within the boundaries of Deerfield Township except that portion hereof within the City of Highwood. The polling place of said precinct will be at the High School Building in the City of Highland Park.

PRECINCT NUMBER 2

All that portion of said District lying within the City of Highwood. The polling place of said precinct will be in the grade school in the City of Highwood.

PRECINCT NUMBER 3

All that portion of the District in Vernon Township and all that portion of said territory within West Deerfield Township except that portion thereof within the Village of Bannockburn and that portion thereof of said School District Number 106. The polling place of said precinct will be in the grade school in the Village of Deerfield.

PRECINCT NUMBER 4

All that portion of said District lying in the Village of Bannockburn and all that portion of said District lying in School District Number 106. The polling place of said precinct will be in the grade school in the Village of Bannockburn.

The polls at the election will be opened at twelve o'clock noon and will be closed at seven o'clock P.M. on said day.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE CHANGING THE NAMES AND DESIGNATIONS OF CERTAIN STREETS, AVENUES AND THOROUGHFARES IN THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK," PASSED AND APPROVED JULY 24, 1950.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION I. That Section I of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Changing the Names and Designations of Certain Streets, Avenues and Thoroughfares in the City of Highland Park," Passed and Approved July 24, 1950, be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Section I the following:

The name of the street known as Orchard Street in the City of Highland Park be and the same is hereby changed to that of Orchard Lane, by which name it shall, after the effective date of this ordinance, be known and designated.

SECTION II. This amending ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and recordation, as provided by law.

LEGAL

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR PRO RATA REIMBURSEMENT BY PROPERTY OWNERS OF THE COST OF INSTALLATION OF PRIVATE IMPROVEMENTS:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION I. Whenever any property owner shall have heretofore or shall hereafter at his own cost construct within the city streets or public thoroughfares of the City, pursuant to permit and authority received from the City, a sanitary or storm sewer or water line extension in accordance with City standards and specifications, inspected and approved by the City, and when properties other than the property of the person constructing such improvement shall intervene and abut upon that section of the street within which such improvement lies, then when the constructing owner shall furnish certification and satisfactory evidence of the cost of such improvement, the City Clerk shall investigate the reasonableness thereof in accordance with existing prices, and when the corporate authorities shall be satisfied as to such reasonableness, the City Clerk shall make appropriate record of the nature, extent, location and cost of such improvement.

SECTION II. Said improving owner shall further, prior to the inception of the work upon such improvement, deposit with the City Clerk a waiver of liability of or right of reimbursement from the City of the cost of such improvement.

SECTION III. Whenever the owner or owners of any such intervening property or properties shall thereafter apply to the City for right to tap into or make connection with such privately constructed sewer or water line extension, then the City Clerk shall compute and certify to such applicant the pro-rata cost of construction of that section of such line abutting applicant's property and shall before issuing permit to tap into or connect therewith receive such pro-rata contribution or reimbursement and upon receipt remit the same to the person constructing such line. The determination of the City Clerk as to the amount of such contribution shall, in the absence of willful fraud or misconduct, be conclusive as between the City and the person having constructed such line.

SECTION IV. The sum in Section I hereof provided to be contributed by intervening owners shall be in addition to and exclusive of fees required and fixed by ordinance as inspection or permit fees for connection with or tap into City sewer or water lines.

SECTION V. When the owner or owners of property contiguous to the property of any owner who shall have previously constructed any private improvement as above described shall be desirous of connecting to and extending such sewer or water line within the public streets, then such extension shall be permitted only if in the opinion of the City Engineer the existing facility shall be adequate for such purpose and provided that such extension shall be made along the total frontage of the property of the applicant owner abutting upon such street.

SECTION VI. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and recordation, as provided by law.

90 YEARS AGO APRIL 12, 1861
CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS UNDER THE COMMAND OF GEN. BEAUREGARD OPENED FIRE ON FORT SUMTER, CHARLESTON, S.C.—STARTING THE CIVIL WAR.

FORT SUMTER WAS GARRISONED BY CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS FROM APRIL 13, 1861 TO FEB. 17, 1862 WHEN APPROACH OF GENERAL SHERMAN'S UNION ARMY OF 70,000 SOLDIERS MADE EVACUATION OF WHOLE CHARLESTON SECTOR NECESSARY.

REINFORCED, AND WITH MODERN COAST GUNS MOUNTED ON ITS RAMPARTS, FORT SUMTER STILL CONSTITUTES AN IMPORTANT UNIT IN CHARLESTON'S DEFENSIVE SYSTEM.

Better Dressed at a Lower Cost

By giving servicemen a money allowance to purchase uniforms, the Armed Forces are saving \$147 million Dollars a year. This "incentive plan" was one result of Hoover Commission recommendations.

TAXPAYERS have been saved about \$2 billion dollars annually through legislation which has included recommendations of the non-partisan Hoover Commission. Many of the most important bills remain, however, to be passed before the 82nd Congress. These include: (1) modern personnel management methods; (2) better service for veterans; (3) unified Federal hospitals; (4) a better service for officers; (5) a check on "pork barrel" public works; (6) an up-to-date Agriculture Department. Now more than ever, dollars saved through efficient government mean extra dollars for defense.
