Mr. Musser is doing outstanding work for our city—but his splendid work is not spotlighted.



Meyerding Will Address Couples' Club

"It's Your Neck" according to Edward Meyerding, executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union's Chicago Division, who will address the Couples Club of the North Shore Congregation Israel at 8:15 p.m. Sunday, April 15, in the Temple Lounge in Glencoe.

The primary function of the Civil Liberties Union is to furnish legal counsel to support and maintain our civil liberties as stated in the Bill of Rights of the Constitution no matter who is involved.

Mr. Meyerding, a native of Rochester, Minn., holds a Master's degree in Sociology from the University of Chicago and an A. B. from Colorado College. He worked with the American Friends Service Committee in Philadelphia and aided delinquent boys in Boston while with the Charles Hayden Foundation.
