**Neatness In Our Parks**

In preceding articles brief descriptions have been given of the many parks and park properties which add to the beauty and give enjoyment to the citizens of Highland Park. In the last article the financing of the Park District was described and the relatively low cost to each taxpayer was brought out.

With Spring and Summer just around the corner it will soon be time to have all our parks and beaches in usage once again. It is therefore only fitting that thoughts should be directed to the maintenance of Park District properties. Naturally, the Board of Park Commissioners and the Superintendent of Parks, Edward J. Brown, are preparing plans to condition the parks, the golf course, and the beaches for our citizens' enjoyment. This is no small task as the Park District men take care of some 250 acres of land in addition to the two beaches, each complete with bath house facilities.

When the activities on the Park District system are in full swing—with baseball games in Sunset Park, many golfers on the fairways at Sunset Valley, hundreds of people at Central Avenue Beach and at Rosewood Beach, picnickers

in various other parks, the very fact that we have such fine Park District facilities in our city is most gratifying to all Highland Parkers. However, it also presents a great problem to the Park District—a problem that could be simplified tremendously by enlisting the aid and thoughtfulness of those who are using our parks. This relates to the wanton carelessness taking place every year in discarding papers, food containers, soft drink bottles, (and more often hard drink containers), and other types of litter on Park properties.

In addition to the nuisance of having to assign Park District personnel to the task of cleaning up our parks, there is also the danger of tin cans and broken glass on our beaches—to say nothing of the unsightliness caused by such debris. The taxpaying property owner in Highland Park has a definite stake and interest in the Parks and Beaches of our city. Just as papers, bottles, tin cans,

etc. would not be countenanced for an instant on the front lawns of our yards, so also such types of foreign articles should not be strewn haphazardly over the landscapes of our parks. Rubbish containers are strategically located on Park District properties for depositing such refuse.

Let's all assist in keeping our parks neat and beautiful by using these containers.
