Under the supervision of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Semple, Mrs. William E. Morgan and Miss Luella Paul of the Principia Upper School faculty, the girls observed sessions and committee meetings of the House and Senate and enjoyed guided tours of Mount Vernon and Arlington; the National Archives Building and Justice Department; the Capitol and Supreme Court; Pan American Union; Corcoran Art Gallery; Washington Monument and Lincoln Memorial; Department of State; Library of Congress; Smithsonian Museum; Bureau of Printing and Engraving; Jefferson Memorial; the Pentagon; National Art Gallery; and the British Embassy.

Then an overnight boat trip took the group to Hampton Roads and Norfolk where they visited the Mariner's Museum, Yorktown, Battlefield, Jamestown, and the restored capitol of Colonial Virginia at Williamsburg.

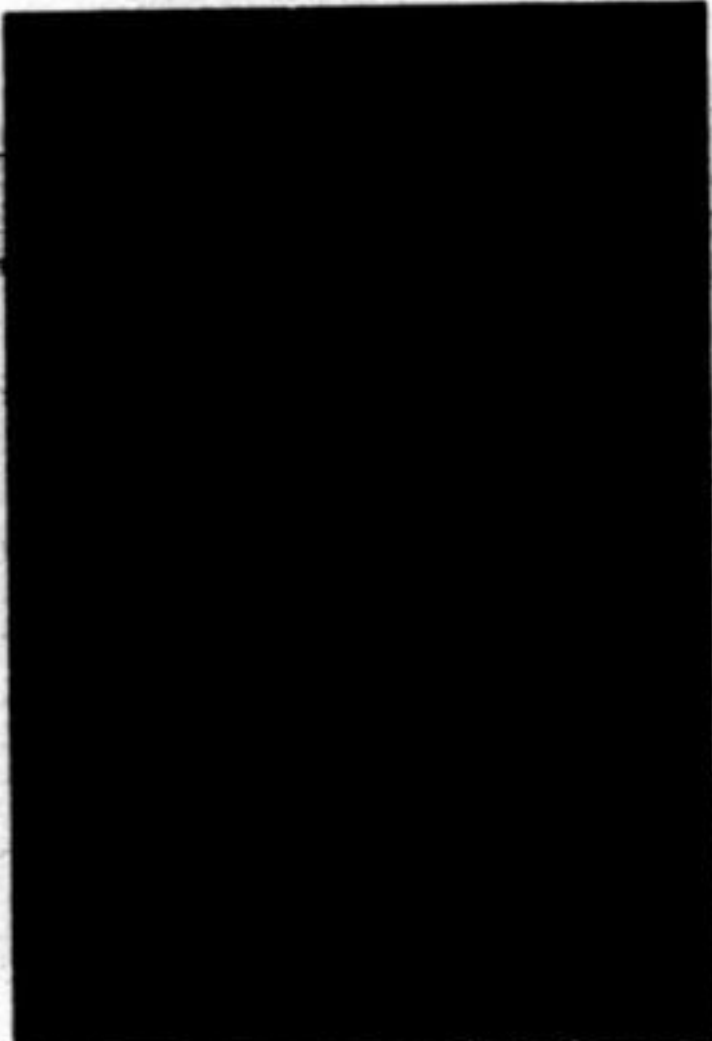
