"THE SPORTSLIGHT"

One of the most thrilling evenings we have spent was last Friday at the Tournament of Champions at Oak Park. Along with several boys from Highland Park high school who got into this tough competition and did right well for themselves was the thrill of seeing two fine lads battle it out in the pole vault and one come within one-eighth of an inch of tying the National Interscholastic record.

Dale Foster of Champaign gave Dean McGown of Lyons Twp. a real tussle but fell out at 13 feet even. McGown made a jump that was thought to have been 13 feet 4 inches and on his third try cleared the bar by inches. However after the judges had measured with levels and other methods it was found that the bar was at 13 feet 3 3/4 inches. The record for indoor competition is held by a Detroit youngster with a jump of 13 feet 1/2 inch made in 1949. McGown then tried to clear the bar at 13 feet four inches, actual measurement, but failed after three attempts, the last one missed by the closest of margins. It was a tough break for the plucky youngster who thought, as the whole crowd did, that he had broken the record and then found he was short by one-eighth of an inch.

Boys who placed for Highland Park were: Tom Compere, Karl Salo, Arvid Sagi and John Wolter who took second in the freshman 4 lap relay. Bob George tied for third in the high jump; Bill Dobus took fifth in the 60 yard low hurdles. The first ten teams in the tournament were Oak Park, 48; Philips, 40; Evanston, 34; Lyons, 25; Maine, 20; New Trier, 12; Highland Park, 11 1/2; Riverside, 10; Englewood, 10 and Proviso, 10.
