## LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE CHANGING THE NAMES AND DESIGNATIONS OF CERTAIN STREETS, AVENUES AND THOROUGHFARES IN THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK," PASSED AND APPROVED JULY 24, 1950.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION I. That Section I of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Changing the Names and Designations of Certain Streets, Avenues and Thoroughfares in the City of Highland Park," Passed and Approved July 24, 1950, be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following:

The name of that portion of the street designated as County Line Road lying within the City of Highland Park and extending from the Westerly line of Sheridan Road projected to the Easterly line of Sheridan Road as projected from the South into Highland Park, said portion being South of, adjacent to and abutted by the South line of Caroline Subdivision and the South line of Baird and Warner's Addition to Deere Park Subdivision, all in the South West quarter of fractional Section 31, Township 43 North, Range 13, East of the Third Principal Meridian, is hereby denominated and changed to that of Sheridan Road, by which name it shall after the effective date of this ordinance be known and designated.

SECTION II. This amending ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and recording, as provided by law.

## LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A SEPARATE SYSTEM OF STREET NUMBERING FOR SOUTH DEERE PARK DRIVE IN THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

THAT, WHEREAS, the City of Highland Park has heretofore adopted an ordinance establishing a uniform system of street numbering within the City of Highland Park, repealing, amending or superseding the provisions of Sections 1 to 5, inclusive, of Article II of Chapter XLVIII of the Highland Park City Code, in and by which said ordinance a certain straight South base line and Easterly base line are established, from which said base lines and in accordance with formula street numbers have been heretofore assigned or will be hereafter assigned, and

WHEREAS, the circumstances of the public thoroughfare named and designated as South Deere Park Drive do not permit the numbering of said street in accordance with such formula, and WHEREAS, it is desirable for the avoidance of confusion and for the purposes of certainty that the street numbers upon such street be assigned in a manner other than that prescribed by the general formula;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION I. Beginning upon the effective date of this ordinance, it shall be the duty of each owner or occupant of each improved parcel of land within the City of Highland Park abutting upon South Deere Park Drive, or any parcel or combination of parcels of land hereafter sought to be improved, and lying and abutting upon said public street to deliver to the City Clerk of the City of Highland Park a legal or surveyor's description of such parcel or combination of parcels of real estate, and the City Clerk shall thereupon assign to each such parcel a street number in accordance with the following formula:

A. Beginning upon said street at its entrance to the public street known as Sheridan Road in the City of Highland Park and beginning upon the Southerly or outer line of said street and following the outer line of said street throughout its course, progressing first in an Easterly direction, said City Clerk shall assign odd numbers to parcels of land abutting upon said outer line, beginning with the number 1, and shall assign even numbers to the parcels of land abutting upon the inner or opposite line of said street, in a number not to exceed 200.

B. In assigning such numbers, said City Clerk shall prorate the numbers available and limited as above in accordance with the linear measurements of the frontage.

C. In assigning numbers to the frontage abutting upon said street, the numbers shall be assigned in sequence upon alternate sides of said street throughout the course of said street.

SECTION II. Display of Street Numbers. Beginning upon the date of the assignment of numbers to the parcels of land in accordance with the foregoing, each owner or occupant of improved real estate abutting upon South Deere Park Drive shall provide, place and maintain such street number so assigned in a manner that the same may be easily and distinctly read, at or near the front entrance of the improvement, not more than 25 feet from the lot line, or, if such front entrance shall be distant from the front line a distance greater than 25 feet, then upon a tree, post or standard in a position near and adjacent to the walk, drive or approach to the building. Where an owner or occupant shall elect to install or maintain a reflecting style of street number on the city parkway, the same shall be permitted, except that such installation shall be in addition to the above provision.

SECTION III. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and recording, as provided by law.

SECTION IV. The provisions hereof shall not be deemed to repeal or supersede the provisions of an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Establishing a Uniform System of Street Numbering Within the City of Highland Park (Repealing, Amending or Super-

seeding the Provisions of Sections 1 to 5, inclusive, of Article II of Chapter XLVIII of the Highland Park City Code," Passed and Approved 1950, except as to the specific public street involved herein.

## History of the Church

The history of the congregation of the Redeemer Church dates back nearly a hundred years, when, about 1847, a group of German Lutherans came to this community, forming a settlement along Green Bay Road and the County Line. Their first pastor was Rev. C. August Selle of Chicago, who made the trip by oxcart once a month, to conduct services in private homes.

Rev. Selle was succeeded in 1853 by Rev. Henry Wunder. Under his leadership a congregation was organized under the name of Trinity Lutheran church, and in 1886 a church was erected on Green Bay Road near County Line road.

In 1888 a branch of the mother church was established in Highland Park under Rev. J. Adam Detzer, Jr.—Services were then held in McDonald's Hall, the present site of the Highland Park Bank, and later at Evans' Hall, Central and Second.

At this time the little church shared the ministrations of Rev. Detzer, Jr. with an Evanston church. In May, 1890, Rev. J. Adam Detzer, Sr., of Racine, Wis., became the pastor, and soon transferred his residence to Highland Park.

The present church edifice, at Central and McGovern, was started in 1890 and dedicated on April 26, 1891.

Pastors who have succeeded Rev. Detzer, Sr. are Rev. A. Sallmann, Rev. A. Baumann, Rev. Starck, Rev. W. F. Suhr, and the present pastor, Rev. H. K. Platzer.

Rev. Platzer was born in New York City. He attended Concordia Collegiate Institute of Bronxville, and Concordia Seminary of St. Louis, Mo., receiving his Master's degree in Psychology at Western Reserve, University of Cleveland, and taught at Concordia for two years. He became assistant pastor in Hell's Kitchen, near Times Square, New York City, and later established a church in Cleveland, where he served five years.

Since January, 1942, he has been pastor of the congregation in Highland Park, also serving a church in Lake Forest, which has grown to independence in the past nine years. With his wife and two children, he lives at 1817 No. Green Bay Road.
