North Shore Clinic Endorsed By Medical Societies

Seven North Shore physicians have consented to serve on the Medical Advisory Committee of the North Shore Mental Association, which is sponsoring a mental health clinic to be located in the Highland Park Hospital, for the use of the residents of the five North Shore villages, Wilmette, Kenilworth, Winnetka, Glencoe, and Highland Park. They are: Dr. John J. Ballenger of Wilmette, Dr. Maurice H. Wald and Dr. George F. Munns of Winnetka, Dr. David Levitin and Dr. Franklin K. Gowdy of Glencoe and Dr. Douglas Boyd and Dr. Albert H. Slepman of Highland Park.

The North Shore Mental Health Association has received the endorsement of the North Suburban branch of the Chicago Medical Society, and the Lake County Medical Society.

A member of the medical advisory committee has said: "The staff of the clinic will be carefully chosen, to meet the high standards set by the directors of the association and by its medical advisory committee. This clinic should prove invaluable to the community for counselling services in child guidance problems, as well as in the prevention and treatment of various emotional ills among adults."

In addition to giving final approval of the professional qualifications of the medical staff, other functions of this committee will be to advise on the policies of intake and referral to proper agencies, and to advise on the scale of fees.

The staff of the clinic will consist of psychiatrists, and a psychologist, a psychiatric social worker, and a clinic secretary. Dr. Joselyn, who is to be director of the clinic will be one of the practicing psychiatrists.

The psychiatrist, the psychologist, and the psychiatric social worker will constitute a team which will pool its findings on each case accepted at the clinic. Diagnosis, treatment recommendations, and methods of carrying out these recommendations will be considered as a related whole. Some of the local clinics operating on this plan are Michael Reese Hospital, The Institute for Juvenile Research, and Women's and Children's Hospital.

Cases will be accepted on the basis of treatability with the intention of avoiding involvement in long-term, non-productive situations. Also, where referral is by an agency such as schools or courts, those cases, whose principles have widest application in the community will be given preference.
