FLEET NEWS

Ensign Stephen J. Pollak, USN, of 605 Bronson lane is serving with United Nations forces in the Korean area as a crew member aboard the destroyer USS Borie.

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The Borie operated with Task Force 95 during a Naval siege on 250 miles of Korea's northeast coast recently. In this operation, the force directed intensified bombardment into shore installations at Wonsan, Songjin and Chongjin, destroying communist shore emplacements and severing Red supply lines in those areas. The concentration of Naval fire power continued through fair and foul weather, with enemy fortifi-

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
