Mrs. Paul Date Accompanies Republican Group To Capital

After an interesting and informative week in Washington, beginning May 14, a tired but enthusiastic group of 27 Republican women have returned to their respective homes in the 13th Congressional District. This is the first group to accept invitations from the Congresswoman, Marguerite Stitt Church, to see "Government In Action."

Their program opened with a luncheon at the Palladium Room, Shoreham Hotel, Headquarters for the group, and included a dinner especially arranged at the Congressional Club to meet women representatives in Congress. Among the guests were Senator Margaret Chase Smith, Maine; Congresswoman Marquerite Stitt Church, Evanston; Edith Nourse Rogers, Massachusetts; Judge Ruth Thompson, Michigan; Katherine St. George, New York; Mrs. Gilford Mayes, assistant chairman of the Republican National Committee and national committeewoman of Idaho; Mrs. Carol Kearns, wife of the representative from Pennsylvania, President of the League of Republican Women of the District of Columbia, and vice-chairman National Federation of Republican Women's clubs; Mrs. Bertha Adkins, executive director of the Women's Division of the Republican National Committee, and National Committeewoman from Maryland.

Also included on the program were visits to the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis and a reception at the mansion of the Governor McKeldin of Maryland, the 5-car caravan being provided with a police escort. Visits were made also to Mount Vernon, the Mellon Art Galleries, Smithsonian Institute, Library of Congress, Supreme Court, House of Representatives and Senate. Lee's house, Washington's church, Dunbarton Oaks, Arlington National cemetery and included a hearing of the Un-American Activities Committee. To quote Mrs. Alverta Stewart, Chairman of the Women's Republican Club of the 13th Congressional Club: "Everyone of us was most impressed while attending the hearing by the Committee on Un-American Activities, at which time a Hollywood actor was being interrogated. Refusing to commit himself, he stood firmly on the constitutional rights which in our estimation he was at the same time trying to destroy." Mrs. Stewart further commented that women must alert themselves in governmental affairs if this intense trend toward communism is to be stopped.

Representing Highland Park in the Lake County group was Mrs. Paul Date.
