To Pay Public Service Bills Bi-Monthly

More than 600,000 customers of the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois will soon be paying their electric and gas bills every other month instead of monthly, according to a proposal filed by the company today with the Illinois Commerce Commission.

Reasons given for the proposed change are operating economies, customer savings and convenience, and conservation of manpower. Public Service plans to start putting the new program into effect in August. The company informed the commission that the proposed changeover from monthly to bi-monthly billing is primarily in the interest of economy. Annual savings of \$500,000 (before federal income taxes) are estimated. It was also pointed out that the new program would be a convenience to a vast majority of the company's customers who would pay bills six times a year instead of twelve as at present. Customer savings in postage, checks, money orders, etc., are estimated at \$100,000 a year.

The company asserted that it had been following a policy of strictest economy in keeping with good service in an effort to offset rising operating costs. Despite this policy, expenses are still rising, it was said.

"This request, if granted, will be another major step in our efforts to keep electric and gas rates as low as possible in the face of higher operating costs," a company statement said.

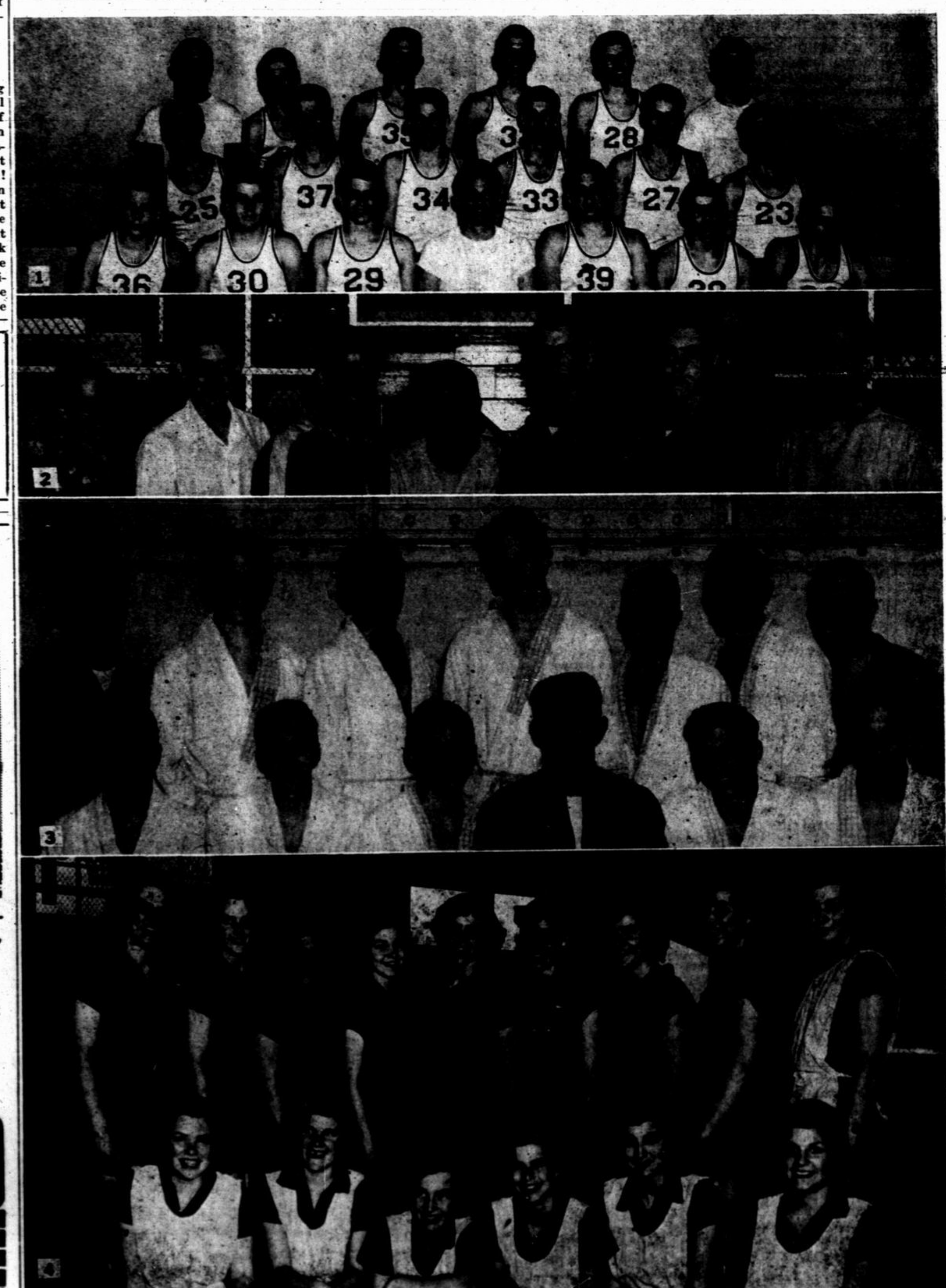
