The coming of warm summer weather—pleasant on most counts—also brings a danger that is a very real one to the parents of all young children. Warm weather is also polio weather.

Although American medicine is conducting constant research, and although the frontiers of our knowledge are advancing steadily, we still don't know enough about the disease to set up positive safeguards against it. Nevertheless there are certain rules which are strongly recommended. To minimize, as much as possible, the danger that your child might contract polio, observe the following precautions recommended. by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis:

Don't let your child get chilled.

Don't let your child mix with new groups.

Don't let your child get overtired.

Don't have any throat or mouth operations performed on your child during the summer months.
