Floriculture Section Of Lake Co. Fair Promises Great Appeal

The Floriculture section of the Lake County Fair to be held at Waucconda August 2-3-4-5 has been completely reviewed and many changes have been made to appeal to the flower growers of the county.

These changes have been brought about by the efforts of the chairman of the section, Mrs. Alfred Lloyd Roulet and a committee of eight men appointed by the Men's Garden Club of Libertyville and Mundelein.

The committee feels that most flowers are grown by the people who grow flowers, on a small scale as a hobby and to beautify the home. Most of the flowers exhibited will be shown by people who make a small planting of each of several kinds.

In bringing the floriculture section up to date the committee has eliminated some classes, added new ones and made changes in the variety and number of flowers to be shown.

Many people grow a few potted plants in the home and thirteen classes are included to appeal to these growers of potted plants: forty-four classes are included in the cut flower section, no class calling for more stems than can be met by the flower grower growing but a few flowers in the back yard.

The Libertyville-Mundelein Men's Garden Club is making a strong drive to make the section on Floriculture the largest and finest in the history of the fair. Every member of the Club is being urged to enter the show and this coupled with the efforts of others in the county is expected to make this one of the most interesting sections in the Fair.

Guest Star At August Music Festival

Yma Sumac, widely-heralded Peruvian singer, will be one of the guest stars who will appear at the 22nd annual Chicagoland Music Festival, sponsored by the Chicago Tribune Charities, Inc., Philip Maxwell, Festival director, announced this week.

She will sing before an audience of approximately 90,000 persons at the Festival concert in Soldiers' field on the evening of Aug. 25, and will appear at the annual Festival luncheon in the Stevens hotel on Friday noon, Aug. 25. Her singing will be a part of the concert program which will be broadcast by radio station W-G-N and the Mutual network between 9 and 10 p.m. on Aug. 25.

Miss Sumac, who is believed to have descended from Inca royalty, is said to have the greatest vocal range of any woman singing on the concert or opera stage today.

"There is no voice like hers in the world of music today," wrote Glenn Dillard Gunn, music critic with the Washington Times-Herald, of Miss Sumac. "Such voices happen only once in a generation."

Lake Reaches Unusual High

It is no news to the shore line communities, park districts and property owners that Lake Michigan is high again in 1951. The mean levels in June this year were 581.17 above sea level, higher than any year since the high level of 1929 when so great damage was done to the beaches and bluffs.

One favorable point is that if the usual annual cycle obtains, the lake level will begin to recede after July or August to a low in January or February.

Many of the old piers, jetties and groynes have been destroyed and have not been replaced. The beach sand formerly retained by them has moved southward more rapidly, leaving no beach or narrower, steeper beach both above and below water level. With this protection gone or reduced the full unbroken force of high waves has already attacked the bluff at many places. Where property owners and public agencies have installed the more modern steel, timber or concrete groynes usually 100 to 150 feet long and a similar distance apart, the sand moving southerly has generally lodged on the northerly side or on both sides. As a result the beach under water and above has protected the shore line from most serious attack even though the water is higher and the beach narrower.

All owners of Lake Michigan frontage, public and private are urged to restore damaged groynes before the injury to their own and adjacent properties becomes greater. Permits for all construction work on the lake shore must be obtained from the Illinois Division of Waterways, 160 North LaSalle Street and from the United States Corps of Engineers, Merchandise Mart, and the advice of those engineers is good.
