ARTHUR G. HUMPHREY, JR. TAKES A BRIDE

Before an altar banked with white gladioli, Shasta daisies, greenery and candelabra, Miss Kathleen Belle Kelsey became the bride of Arthur Gordon Humphrey, Jr., in a double ring ceremony at the First Presbyterian church in Huntington, Indiana on Sunday, July 22. The 3 p.m. ceremony was read by the Rev. David Robert Hutchinson. The bride is the daughter of Mr. Knowlton H. Kelsey of Huntington and the late Mrs. Kelsey, and the bridegroom is the son of Mayor and Mrs. Humphrey of 919 Judson avenue.

The bride, who was given in marriage by her father, was gowned in white point de Paris lace over white satin with tiny satin buttons from the collar to the bottom of the skirt. The fitted bodice was made with an Elizabethan collar; the long sleeves extended to points over the hands and the bouffant skirt ended in a Cathedral train. Her fingertip veil fell from a lace cloche. The point lace handkerchief she carried was part of her mother's wedding ensemble. Her shower bouquet was of white roses centered with a white orchid.

Four attendants in frocks of ankle length white organdy over taffeta preceded the bride to the altar. The maid of honor, Miss Joverne Bulmer of Woodstock, formerly of Braeside, sorority sister of the bride, was in white organdy over lavender taffeta, while the bridesmaids, Miss Lenora Larsen of Bay Village, Ohio, and Miss Phyllis Luttrell of Berea, Ohio, also sorority sisters, and Miss Mona Lou Kettering of Huntington, were in white organdy over spring green taffeta. Their dresses had tight fitting bodices with full skirts scalloped at the bottom, and off-the-shoulder scalloped necklines. Their taffeta sashes matched their dresses, as did their cloche caps of organdy and taffeta. They all wore organdy mitts and carried sprays of white Majestic daisies and ivy, tied with nylon net to match their dresses.

Kenneth, a fraternity brother of the bridegroom, served as best man and James Humphrey, brother of the bridegroom, also a fraternity brother; David Kelsey, brother of the bride and Robert Bresnick of Whiting, Indiana, another fraternity brother, ushered. Miss Judith Holman of Evanston, a sorority sister of the bride, was soloist. She sang "Through the Years" and "Ich Liebe Dich," accompanied at the organ by Miss Esther Davis of Huntington. "The Lord's Prayer" was played during the ceremony.

Mrs. Alice Oldenburg, an aunt of the bride, wore a long dress of grey crepe with lavender accessories, a hat of lavender straw and a corsage of orchids. The paternal grandmother wore a figured dress complemented by a corsage of gardenias. Mrs. Humphrey chose a dress of cornflower blue georgette crepe and matching half hat for the occasion. Her corsage, also, was an orchid.

The reception table, which carried out the lavender and spring green motif, was beautifully decorated with Shasta daisies and greenery.

For her "going-away" costume, the bride chose a pink linen suit, matching straw hat and white linen accessories.

After a short wedding trip, Mr. Humphrey and his bride will spend a few days in Highland Park before going on to Baltimore, Maryland, where they will make their home. Mr. Humphrey, who is in the army, is stationed in Maryland.

Most people know the parable of the "pearl of great price," and the man who sold all that he had to buy it (Matt. 13:46).

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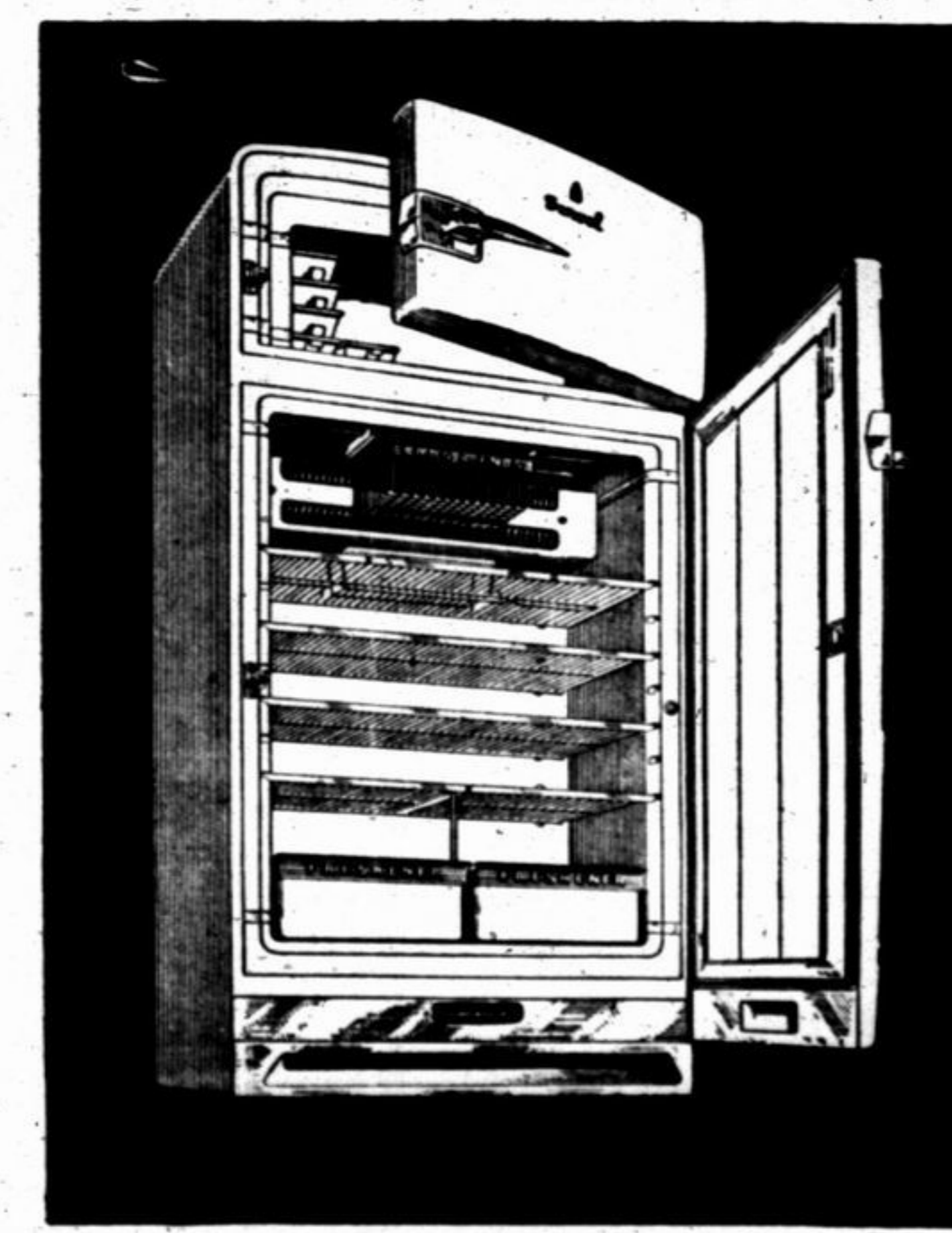
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
