College Students Must Report Scholastic Standings

A warning to college students that they are responsible for having the scholastic standing reported to their Selective Service local boards before August 20, if they wish to be considered for deferment from induction into the Armed Forces, was issued recently by Colonel Paul G. Armstrong, Selective Service Director for Illinois.

Some students evidently have the mistaken impression that colleges will automatically supply the necessary certification to local boards, Colonel Armstrong said. He emphasized that the students themselves must initiate this action by getting three copies of SSS Form No. 109 from any local board and delivering them to the college with the request that they be filled out and the certificate sent at once to the student's own local board.

Colonel Armstrong added that deferred persons remain liable for military service until they reach the age of 35.

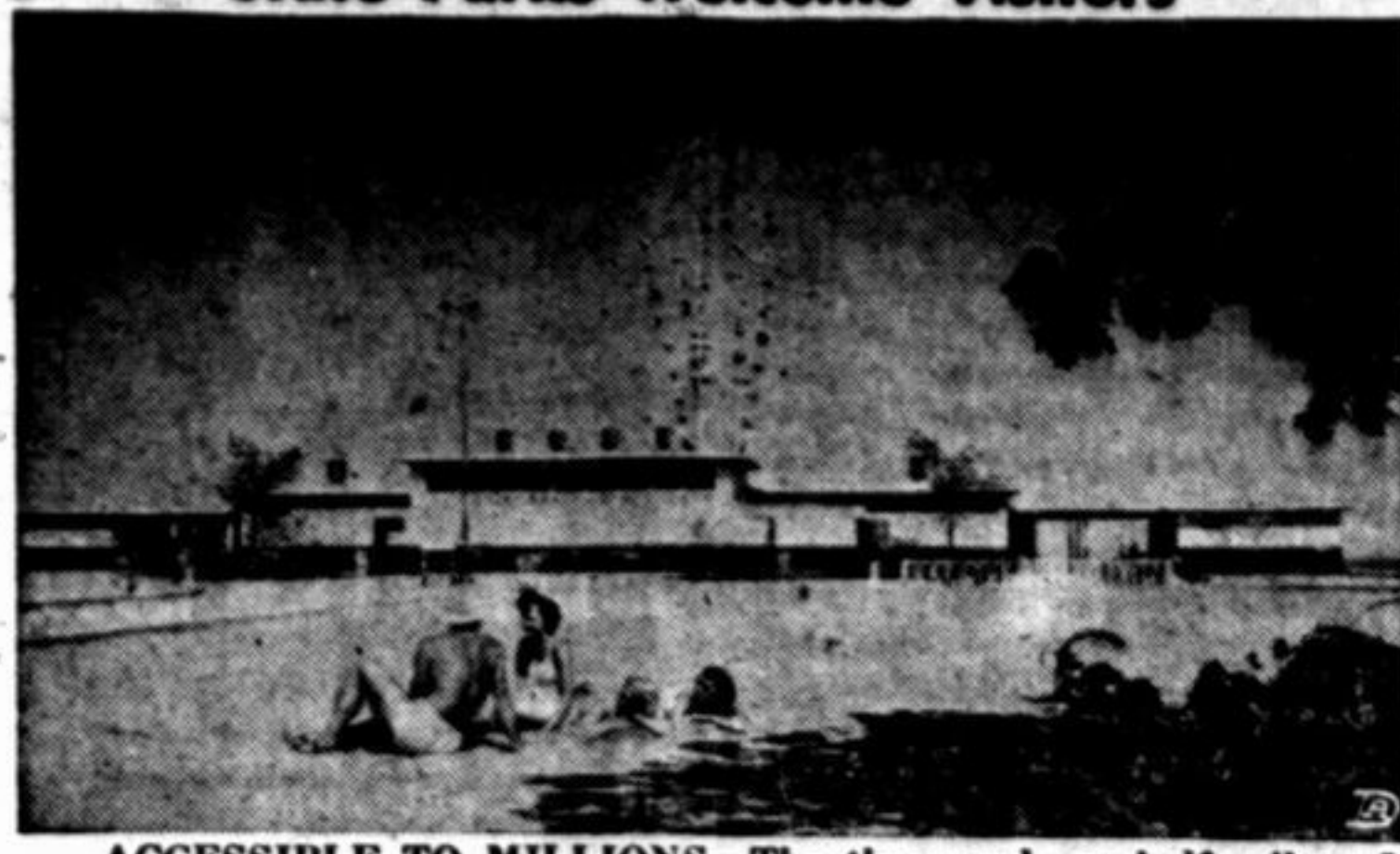

State Parks Welcome Visitors



ACCESSIBLE TO MILLIONS—The three and one-half miles of beach at Illinois Beach State Park on Lake Michigan is easily accessible to more than one-half of the state's population.

SPRINGFIELD—On the shores of Lake Michigan, Illinois Beach State Park is one of the newest, largest and most popular in the vast network of state parks.

Located in Lake county between Waukegan and Zion, east of state route 42, Illinois Beach State Park provides three and one-half miles of clean sandy beach along the shore of Lake Michigan.

Recreation for the entire family is provided in the state's 28,000-acre park system which each year provides relaxation for more than 9,000,000 visitors.

For children who tire easily of scenic grandeur, there are swings for all sizes, slides and a variety of other play equipment, and sandboxes for the tiny tots.

The attraction with the widest appeal no doubt is the provision which Illinois has made for family picnics — barbecue pits, out-of-door ovens and enough tables to seat 100,000 merry-makers at one time. For those who prefer, some of the 61 state parks and memorials have restaurants with "atmosphere."

Largest of the parks in land area is Pere Marquette, near the junction of the Illinois and Mississippi rivers. A historic highlight

of its 5,000 acres is a cross which marks the spot where Father Marquette, Louis Joliet and five companions—the first white men in Illinois—turned their canoes up the Illinois river in 1673.

In the Illinois Ozarks, 12 miles south of Carbondale, is Giant City State Park, especially noted for its rock formations.

During 1950, more than a million persons visited Starved Rock State Park on the Illinois river near Ottawa. Starved Rock, like Pere Marquette and Giant City, has a lodge, guest cabins and restaurant.

Other major parks include Grand Marais, near East St. Louis; White Pines Forest, north of Dixon, and Black Hawk, near Rock Island.

The park with the greatest historical significance, however, is New Salem, 20 miles northwest of Springfield, where Abraham Lincoln spent six formative years of his life. Twenty-five cabins have been authentically restored at New Salem. For eight weeks this summer beginning June 30, a play, "Forever This Land," depicting life in the 1830's, will be presented in a natural outdoor bowl in this park.

Moose Members Plan "Child City" High School

Preliminary plans for the new high school to be built on the campus of the Loyal Order of Moose home and school for children of deceased members at Mooseheart, Ill., have been completed and preparations for the actual construction work are well under way, announces Malcolm R. Giles, director general of the fraternity.

The new building will be of modern design, two stories high, with almost solid glass walls on all four sides, Giles said. Every conceivable educational innovation of present day architecture will be incorporated in the new building with emphasis placed on both comfort and convenience as to appointments.

The preliminary sketches and drawings are being made by Frank Elwood, consulting architect associated with the "Child City." Selection of the actual site for the high school has not yet been determined, said Mr. Giles, but several locations on the campus are being considered.

Contributions to defray the costs of the building are pouring in from Moose members throughout the nation, he said, and member lodges are initiating plans for special enrollment classes dedicated to this new project. The cost of the high school will be subsidized by popular subscription with no special assessments whatsoever.
