plant material. This class will be limited to club members and their sons or daughters only and a small gold cup will be awarded to the child making the best arrangement without any help from his mother. Following is the schedule of the show:

A. Artistic Arrangements

1. An arrangement with zinnias predominating. Open to those who have never entered a show or won a blue ribbon.
2. An arrangement in green and white. Open to those who have received no more than one blue ribbon.
3. Mother and child arrangements using the same plant material. Limited to club members.
4. "Come Autumn in the Country". An arrangement using dried materials.
5. Practical arrangement—the simple line, using any type of material.
6. Complementary arrangement—Container must be part of color scheme.
7. An arrangement copying or complementing a floral picture or print. Picture to be furnished by exhibitor.
8. "Just For Fun" (men's class)—an arrangement in a unique container not to exceed 18 inches overall.
9. Arrangement of a plant stand to be exhibited on patio.
10. An arrangement of potted plant material suitable for the outdoors.
11. Invitation class. An arrangement containing any combination of material or fruit and/or vegetables. For this class several invitations have been sent to outstanding arrangers.

B. Tables, card table to be furnished by exhibitors

1. Kitchen breakfast for two.
 2. Sunday "brunch" on the porch for two.
 3. Supper for two after the play (name your own play).
- All entries must be ready for judging by 11 a.m. on August 25.

"Care" Widens Aid To Yugoslavia

CARE aid to Yugoslavia was augmented today with the introduction of new "bulk food package", containing 25 pounds of flour, 25 pounds of sugar, and ten pounds of rice. The package can be sent for \$11 to any individual in Serbia, Croatia, Slovenia, Montenegro, Macedonia or Bosnia-Herzegovina. In accordance with CARE procedure, quantities of the new bulk package will be stored in CARE mission warehouses in Yugoslavia ready for immediate guaranteed delivery upon receipt of orders at the Chicago CARE Office, 189 W. Madison Street, or any local CARE public service outlet.

DEVIL AND THE DEEP BLUE SEA



No one will crab about this devilled dish when you serve it as an appetizer, as a main dish at a luncheon or buffet supper. Devilled crab is really tops for summertime entertaining. And made with bread crumbs, there's nothing easier.

DEVILLED CRAB

- 2 small cans, or 2 cups crabmeat
- 1 teaspoon mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 cup melted butter or margarine
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 2 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 hard boiled eggs, minced
- 1 tablespoon minced parsley
- 1 teaspoon onion juice
- 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs

Pick over crabmeat and remove any fibrous membranes. Add remainder of ingredients except dry bread crumbs and mix well. Turn into individual ramekins or shells.

Sprinkle tops with dry bread crumbs. Heat thoroughly in a hot oven, 400° F., about 10 to 15 minutes.

To make soft bread crumbs, crumble slices of fresh bread with fingers, or place two slices together as a time and cube with a sharp knife. Crusts may be left on or removed, as desired. But never throw crusts away, they're perfect for dry bread crumbs.

To make dry bread crumbs, grind dry bread through a food chopper, using a fine blade, or toast and crush with a rolling pin. Or use packaged dry bread crumbs.

Selective Service

Men separated from the Armed Forces, and not previously registered, are required by law to register at a Selective Service local board within 30 days of their separation. If they were born after August 30, 1922, and have reached their 18th birthday. This also applies to those separated from the Coast Guard, the Coast and Geodetic Survey, and the Public Health Service.

Colonel Paul G. Armstrong, Director of Selective Service for Illinois, made this statement today in commenting on reports received from some local boards concerning instances in which separated men were not complying with the regulation.

Failure to comply, Colonel Armstrong said, is a violation of the law. It is not necessary for the man to return to home to register. He may do so at the local board most convenient to him, but should give his home address when he registers.

IN ITS STUDY OF WASTEFUL GOVERNMENT PRACTICES AND INEFFICIENCY, THE HOOPER COMMISSION FOUND 24 SUPERVISORS FOR 25 EMPLOYEES IN ONE UNIT OF THE VETERANS ADMINISTRATION

No wonder 500,000 employees leave government service every year! Scrambled organization, topheavy with executives... endless, pointless paperwork... inexcusable delays. The bi-partisan Hoover Commission—created by unanimous vote of Congress—found these situations in the Veterans Administration and other governmental offices. For example, they discovered that the VA takes five times as long to pay a death claim to a veteran's widow as do private companies and uses four times as much manpower per policy. The Commission recommended methods of streamlining the executive branch of the Government, making it more efficient and economical. Already, 50 per cent of its recommendations have been made into law. The rest—which would save taxpayers approximately three billion dollars—awaits action now. Public support is needed to urge Congress to finish the job quickly so that these funds can be used for essential purposes.
