LENORE PHILLIPS, A BRIDE

Before an altar banked with white roses, white gladioli and greenery, Miss Lenore Nadine Phillips became the bride of David Santi at the St. James church, Highwood, on Saturday, August 4, at 9:30 a.m. The bride is the daughter of Mrs. John Cervi of 423 1/2 Funston avenue and the bridegroom is the son of the Frank Santis of 413 Green Bay road, Highwood.

The bride was lovely in a white satin gown made with long sleeves, buttons from the neckline to the waist of the fitted bodice, and a full skirt which ended in a long train. Her fingertip veil of French tulle fell from a cap, which matched her dress, also button trimmed. Lilies of the valley were attached to the white satin prayer book which she carried. She also carried a pearl rosary, the gift of her mother, and a religious medal, belonging to her maternal grandmother. She presented one dozen white roses at the shrine of the Blessed Mother. Her father, Joseph Phillips, gave her in marriage.

The bride was preceded down the candle lighted aisle by Miss Frances Pasquesi, maid of honor, and four bridesmaids, Mrs. Leonard Favelli (Eileen Phillips), sister of the bride; Miss Millie Passini, her aunt; Miss Jean Calzia and Mrs. Norman Gagon (Lois Mosuch) of Nealsville, Wis. They were gowned alike in white marquisette with wide ice blue satin sashes. Their cap headdress and slippers matched the sashes. Their bouquets were of stephanotis centered with ice blue colored roses.

Miniatures of the other attendants were little Nancy Passini and Lynette Passini, cousins of the bride, who acted as flower girls. Nancy is the daughter of the Ed Passinis of Lewis avenue, Waukegan, and Lynette is the daughter of the Charles Passinis of Oak Terrace, Highwood.

Gloria Lind sang, accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Robert Botner.

Best man was Ray Santi, brother of the bridegroom, and the ushers were Leonard Favelli, Adolph Baracani, Robert Masini and Oswaldo Mazzetta. Guest escorts were Aldo Cabri and Leo Contri.

The bride's mother chose an ice blue tissue shantung dress for the church ceremony, complemented by black velvet accessories. For the evening reception she wore a ballerina frock of orchid and purple marquisette. The bodice was sequin trimmed and the skirt, very full. The flowers in her hair were stephanotis. The Center was beautifully decorated with white bells and white flowers, and ice blue ribbon was used as trim on the tables. A miniature cathedral topped the huge wedding cake.

Mr. Santi and his bride are now in Colorado Springs, Colo., for a two weeks' wedding trip. On their return they will live at 423 Funston ave., Highwood.

The bride was graduated from Highland Park High school and St. Therese Hospital School of Nursing. She is now serving at the Highwood hospital as a registered nurse. Mr. Santi, also a

graduate of Highland Park High school, received his degree from Northwestern university. During World War II, he served with the Navy Air Corps for 22 months. Many out-of-town guests attended the wedding and reception.

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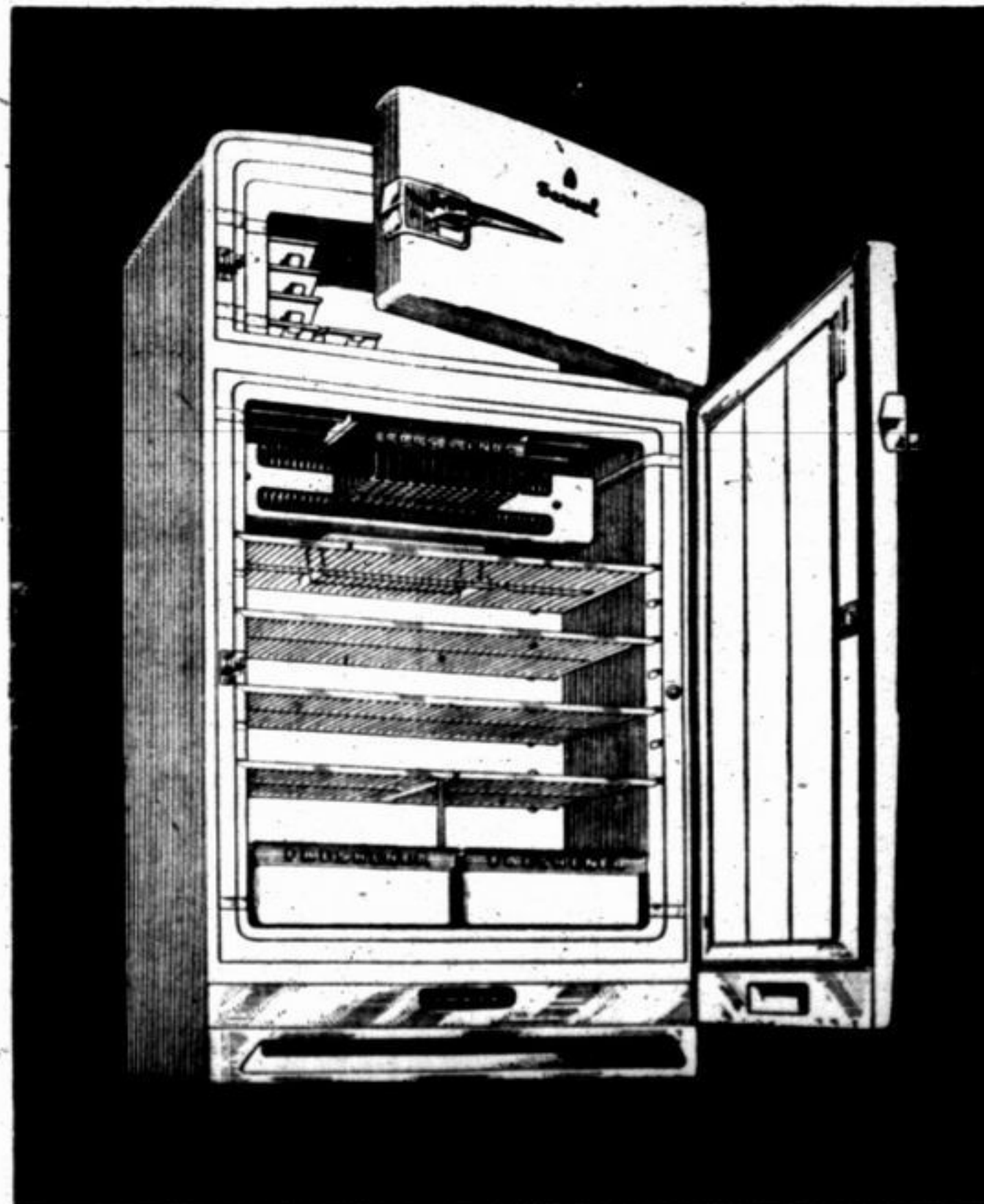
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
