### LEGAL NOTICE

#### Notice of Special Election Township High School District Number 113, Lake County, Illinois

#### NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN

that on Friday, the 31st day of August, 1951, a special election will be held in and for Township High School District Number 113, Lake County, Illinois, for the purpose of submitting to the voters of said School District the following propositions:

1. Shall the maximum tax rate for the educational fund of Township High School District Number 113, Lake County, Illinois, be established at .90 per cent on the full, fair cash value instead of .63 per cent, the maximum rate otherwise applicable to the next taxes to be extended?

(a) Approximate amount extendable under proposed rate is \$915,428.

(b) Approximate amount extendable under rate otherwise applicable to the next taxes to be extended is \$640,800.

2. Shall the maximum tax rate for the building fund of Township High School District Number 113, Lake County, Illinois, be established at .1875 per cent on the full, fair cash value instead of .14 per cent, the maximum rate otherwise applicable to the next taxes to be extended?

(a) Approximate amount extendable under proposed rate is \$190,714.

(b) Approximate amount extendable under rate otherwise applicable to the next taxes to be extended is \$142,400.

That for said election said School District shall constitute four election precincts, and the boundaries thereof and the polling place for each shall be as follows:

#### PRECINCT NUMBER 1

All that part of said District lying within the boundaries of Deerfield Township except that portion hereof within the City of Highwood. The polling place of said precinct will be at the High School Building in the City of Highland Park.

#### PRECINCT NUMBER 2

All that portion of said District lying within the City of Highwood. The polling place of said precinct will be in the grade school in the City of Highwood.

#### PRECINCT NUMBER 3

All that portion of the District in Vernon Township and all that portion of said territory within West Deerfield Township except that portion thereof within the Village of Bannockburn and that portion thereof of said School District Number 106. The polling place of said precinct will be in the grade school in the Village of Bannockburn.

#### PRECINCT NUMBER 4

All that portion of said District lying in the Village of Bannockburn and all that portion of said District lying in School District Number 106. The polling place of said precinct will be in the grade school in the Village of Bannockburn.

The polls at said election shall be opened at twelve o'clock Noon and will be closed at seven o'clock P.M. (Daylight Savings Time) on said day.

#### A GREAT CHAMPION "PAY UP" IS RETIRED

There was a tear in Stan Stucker's eye after the \$5,000 Sportsman's Sprint Championship last Friday night. And there was good reason, for Stan had driven Pay Up, one of Illinois' great champions, for the last time.

But if there was a tear in Stan's eye, E. L. Jordan, the Rockford sportsman, was heart-sick, for the gallant little trotter, now more than 12 years old, had supplied Jordan and his family with many thrills in harness racing.

Pay Up was owned originally by Horace Johnson of Charlotte, N.C. He won a heat in the Hambletonian in 1942 which is the Kentucky Derby of the sulky sport.

Jordan bought the game trotter in 1944 and that's when he began campaigning on the Illinois tracks. When pari mutuel harness racing began in 1946 in Illinois Pay Up was at the height of his career. Chicago fans will long remember the many thrills the black flash gave them. No matter how tough the competition — and he was always in with the best — you could never overlook Pay Up in the betting. Only this Spring the Jordan star brought home a \$54 mutuel on his nose when people were saying "Ah, he was good once, but he's too old now."

But as much as Jordan loved his little trotter, he's a sportsman above everything else. "The little fellow is pretty lame. I just can't stand to see him work any more. He deserves a rest."

Jordan was told a couple of years ago that he should make a pacer out of Pay Up. With his great heart, Pay Up could have won many races since he would have been able to race with the green pacers while he must now compete with the top trotters. But Jordan says he wants harness fans to remember Pay Up as a great trotter and not as just another horse trying to pick up an easy purse.

The life time earnings of the little son of Follow Up are well over \$52,000. That's not bad when you remember that back in the early '40's trotters had to go three heats to pick up the lion's share of a \$200 purse.

Harness racing has lost a great competitor . . . but a game star has gained a well-deserved rest.

#### Greig

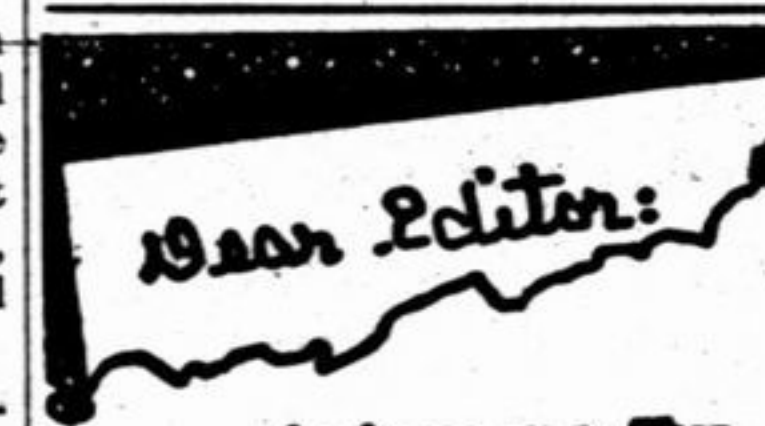
