Dr. Edwards is a graduate of the University of Guelph, and the University of Waterloo Doctorate program in Optometry. He points out that he is a, "Well educated candidate wanting to apply a common sense approach to School Board matters."

He outlines his platform:

- * Dedicated family man who understands the importance of a sound education;

- * taxpayer who knows that rate-payers are pushed to the limit;

- * will bring a business-like attitude to the tough decisions;

- * supports traditional value based classroom learning with sufficient testing to make sure we are using our resources well;

- * will always support teachers trying to attain a high standard of student behaviour;

- * someone who cares about the ability of our system to prepare students for the future.

willing to work with the Trustee is Ward 1 to maximize resources for North Hastings."

Tom Edwards has worked with Don Taylor before - on a N.H.H.S. study committee. He believes that he could work well with him in Belleville, so that the two become an active team, speaking out for North Hastings.

Dr. Edwards recalls the successful struggle of citizens in the Paudash area to save their school. He commends them for their heroic efforts. But he is startled by the countless hours of volunteer work that were poured into the project "because the Trustees of the Board had decided to close a school somewhere without fully considering the wishes of the electorate."

Dr. Edwards adds, "Edwards thinks schools should be closed only when the taxpayers decide they no longer need or want their schools to be open."
