Public Pool in Cardiff Is Open and Waiting for You

The public swimming pool in Cardiff Township is open and ready for use. Bicroft Township Recreation Committee, who took after the pool, invite the public to use it. There is a registration fee.

Citizens of Bicroft pay \$20 per person (up to \$75 per family) for a season's badge, available at the Municipal Office.

Non-residents pay \$30 per person (no more than \$100 per family).

Seniors pay a fee of \$10.

The pool is supervised by staff hired by the Town-

ship of Bicroft. Some of these are also Swimming Instructors who give lessons for the Township. July classes are closed; but registration for August classes is being accepted now.

The day is divided into segments, with Instruction from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., and specified "Adult Swim" and "Open Swim" periods alternating during the afternoon, until 7 p.m.

The pool is located in a public park and playground, at the end
