The personal qua lity of quilts was emphasised as in several cases pieof material were identified as being from a dress or a shirt that had been worn by family members or friends. This

makes the quilt a work with sentimental value and a way to remember people and events.

Sharron Hepburn hopes that classes gives confidence to the quilters to try to fabnew designs, rics and stitches. She is really enthusiastic about passing on this tradition with all skills the colours matching and fitting shapes together.

She began quilting 15 years ago at the age of 14. She has taught in Bancroft for years. Some classes were at the Bancroft Decora-Bancroft ting Centre, others at Country Quilts and Fabrics on Hastings St., Bancroft.

She is near the end of a course for Harcourt quilters held at the Harcourt Community Centre.

Sharron teaches courses of 8 ses-sions of 3 hours each during winter. In the summer she offers short 1 day classes which are in the form of a lecture with a demonstration.

Sharron ages beginners of all ages, even as young as 10 years if the child can manage a sewing machine.

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
