 Monmouth Township Council met on Monday evening, June 12, in Wilberforce, with all members present. New Councillor Jim Deterling made several positive contributions to the discussions of Council.

RECYCLING
 Council is accepting a proposal from Queensway Recycling, of Etobicoke, to manage a recycling program. The company describes 4 phases, with Phase I to take place in mid June. "Queensway Recycling will supply various containers at your landfill sites AT NO COST TO THE TOWN [our capitals], and post signs of acceptable material allowed in each container. We would like the city to notify and encourage residents to separate material before placing into bins to reduce contamination of source separated loads. The bins that will be placed during Phase I will consist of;
 * cardboard,
 * newspaper,
 * cans, and
 * plastic."
 Phase II - equip-

ment such as bailers and compactors - is scheduled for July or August.

HIGHWAY
 Council noted the plan of M.T.O. to do major overhaul work on the highway at Tory Hill. Councillors again complained that there is no left turn lane at the Monmouth Dump. This is an increasingly dangerous situation.

SIGNS
 Gerald Shackleton is frustrated that M.T.O. will not allow a sign to direct people to the United Church. He proposed renaming the South Wilberforce Road, "United Church Road."

A "fingerboard sign" from the M.T.O. costs \$70 to \$75 per year.

BASKETBALL
 "I was really impressed," stated Ted Glendinning, Principal of the Wilberforce Elementary School, after observing Council in action. He asked for permission to put up basketball nets in the Lloyd Watson Centre. End to end of the auditorium would be best. The nets would be hidden against the ceiling when not

in use. The nets were given, about 2 years ago, by Archie Stouffer School.

TENDERS
 Three bids were opened to sell the Township a new loader. Accepted was HUB International Equipment Ltd. of R.R. 4, Lindsay, to supply a 4 x 4 x 4 vehicle for \$78,793.50.

FIRE DEPARTMENT
 Fire fighters spoke with Council about improvements to the Firehall, including roof repairs, repairs to the roll-up doors, repairs to corner bricks, and a better sign - and a sign of any kind at the Tory Hill station.

Council and the Fire Department will work on financing, and consider fund-raising activities.

No one is complaining that the Fire Department has had no calls so far in 1995.

BEAR LAKE PARK

Piano music was presented by Kerry Riley, of North Road, Essonville. "She is good! Tal-



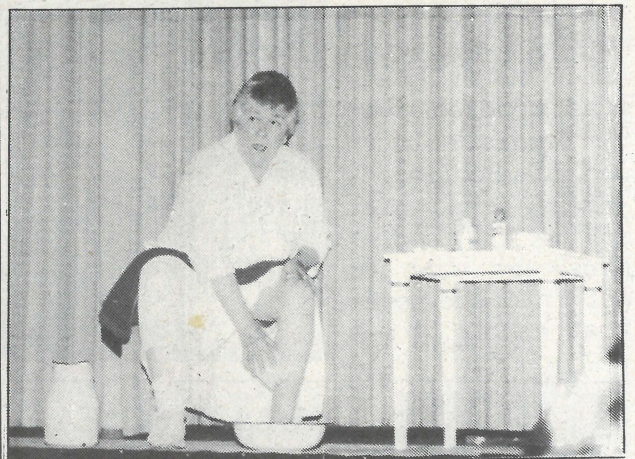
ented!" this writer included in his notes. She was joined by Kim Barnes for a piano duet as well.
