#### Bancroft Becomes A TOWN

Bancroft is of-

ficially a Town.
The notice of approval from the Ontario Municipal Board is dated Wednesday, the 9th day of August, 1995.

This was completed by the first, second, and third reading of a By-Law (No. 649-95) at the Council meeting on Monday,

August 28.

At that point the Village of Bancroft faded into history, and the Town of Bancroft was born.

The major change to be noted will come at the next Municipal elections. The Ontario Municipal Board directed: has That the composition of the Municipal Council for the term beginning ember 1, 1997 composed as December 1, follows: Mayor, Deputy Mayor, and three Councillors Elected At Large.
