Her husband, Ross Agnew, has written the following.

Vicky or "Toy" was born on St. Joseph's Island near Sault Ste. Marie.

As a child learning to speak she found Victoria a tongue twister, and when asked, said her name was "Toy." So she was always Toy at home.

She was the eld-

est of 5 sisters. In 1934, she went train for a to Registered Nurse, at the Ottawa Civic Hospital, and graduated in 1937. and After graduation she worked as a Registered Nurse the Canadian Red Cross in places such as Rich-ard's Landing, Rainy River, Armstrong, Thessalon, Kirkland Lake, Nakina, and Wilberforce.

She married Ross Agnew in 1943.

In 1944, 45, and 46 she specialized out of Toronto as a Registered Nurse.

In 1947 Vicky and Ross bought the General Store in Gooderham and ran it for 22 years. During those 22 years, they raised 2 children: Laurie, a girl, & Barry, a boy.

During that period she nursed locally and also in a Bobcaygeon nursing home.

Later she worked for Dr. Harry Good as an office nurse and filled in at the Pharmacy Department which she also operated.

In 1967 she and Ross sold the Gooderham store. Then in 1972 they moved to Wilberforce. She retired when Dr. Good sold the Pharmacy.

She was a member and Past Matron of the Haliburton Eastern Star.

She had been the Chairwoman of the Glamorgan School Board. She was a Trustee of the Haliburton County B o a r d o f Education.

She was a former Reeve of the Township of Glamorgan. In later years her volunteer work included working in the Ladies Auxiliary of the Wilberforce Royal Canadian Legion Branch 624. She was an L.A. Past President.

She worked as a volunteer for Home Support - Meals on Wheels, etc.

She worked on the Altar Guild at St. Margaret's.

She was a member of the Wilberforce Heritage Guild.
