Bancroft Hospital **Faces Crisis**

Health services should be available in all regions of the country. However, as of October 1, 1995, there is no guarantee that there will be a doctor available to cover the Emergency Department at the North Hastings District days a week, 24 hours a day. We are one of many small rural hospitals that are experiencing problems with physiccoverage in the Emergency Department.

At the same time, our local doctors practices are full and have been for a year. People who do not have a family doctor must come to the hospital for medical care.

The local doctors have advised the Hospital that they are unwilling to continue with the present on-call coverage due to a variety of reasons: health, age, life style, etc. This has been an ongoing concern for some time. In response the Hospital has desig-nated a special fund to assist with the recruitment of physicians The following people have been approached for as-sistance: Mr. Harry Danford, MPP; The District Health Council; The Ministry of Health; and the Ontario Hospital Association (Small Hospitals Division).

War Memorial Damaged

"It's sad," commented several children, as they viewed, on Monday afternoon, September 11, the damage done to the Cenotaph at Wilberforce.

The children felt a personal hurt that anyone would do this in their community to a monument that was to stand as a memorial for them.

Members of the Wilberforce Legion Branch also felt a personal hurt. Did they risk their lives - and their friends and relatives give up their lives - so that the community could mock them, and slap them in the face?

The damage appears, at first, to be relatively slight. Two large field stones have been knocked out of the south west

corner of the memorial. One of the stones, dirty yellow brown on the outside, broke along a smooth face, revealing a dark and granular interior.


But as one stays by the defaced memorial, one begins to no other things. notice

The heavy object used as a weapon also landed on the concrete base, making a crack through the concrete.

The stones were knocked out by a heavy blow. The mortar from there to the top of the monument has a crack, which must be repaired before frosty weather comes.

The Cenotaph was built by Pat Welsh, now deceas-Pat ed. It was dedi-cated in the early 1980's.
