### Telecare Bancroft - 332-2000

This fall marks the twelfth anniversary of Telecare in Bancroft. The third week of September is Telecare Week and the local organization is preparing for special events at that time.

CJNH, the local radio station, will be conducting a "Pledge Week" from Monday to Friday, September 18 - 22. People are invited to participate in this activity by listening to the radio, calling in requests for favourite pieces of

music, and pledging a donation to Telecare in exchange for the pleasure of hearing their selections played over the air.

Telecare is truly a non-profit organization. There is no funding from grants or government agencies. It relies entirely on local donations for all of its operating expenses.

Telephone costs are its major expense. Because personnel is not available in Bancroft, all of the calls are diverted to Telecare Peterborough. At the Annual Meeting in September of 1994, the decision was made to make a change to Remote Call Forwarding in place of the di-

verter to relay calls to Telecare Peterborough. This change was not possible at the time, because that service is not yet available in this area. As an alternative, the service was changed to a toll free [1-800] number. This number went into service in late October and remained in place until the end of February.

The move to the toll free service was effective as a cost-cutting measure but the calling area was opened up to a much wider range and the Peterborough Centre felt that the volunteers there would not be able to provide the information necessary to help callers from more distant communities. As a result, the local Centre
