but since the latter system had been carried, he was willing to asseist in carrying it out.

Mr. BLAKE, in reply to a remark of the previous speaker about the leadership of the Opposition, said the gentlemen on his side had not yet formed themselves into an organized body. When they did so, he should be happy to follow the member for Bothwell as his leader. For himself, he desired no higher position than to do his duty to his party as one of its rank and file.

Hon. Mr. CARLING vindicated his position, claiming that he had supported good measures during the ten years he had sat in Parliament, and that on the question of the franchise raised by the Municipal Bill, he had proved himself a better Reformer than the member for Bothwell or Mr. McKenzle.

Mr. McKELLAR, on the question of the leadership of the Opposition, said he occupied the seat usually assigned to the Opposition leader, sim ply because he found all the other seat on that side occupied when he came here. But he was free to confess that, i talent entitled any man to that position the gentleman who should fill tha seat was his hon. friend from South Bruce and he should be much pleased if his hon friend was acknowledged as holdin that position. He went on to review some points in the political career of th Commissioner of Public Works, and reply to that hon. gentleman's attack up him, with reference to Municipal Bil showing that the responsibility of the raising of the franchise rested on oth shoulders than his own.

The remaining clauses of the Addr were then carried.

Hon. J. S. McDONALD then more the usual formal resolutions for draft and engrossing the Address, which was reed to.

Hon. J. S. McDONALD then method that the Address be signed by the Speand presented to His Excellency by members of the house as are members the Executive Council. Carried.

Hon. J. S. McDONALD moved to when the house adjourns, it do stand journed till Wednesday, 8th Janu Carried.

The house then adjourned at twininutes to two.
