lands. The amount he would state to mor.

Mr. McKELLAR congratulated the Government on adopting a dourse which he had all along urged on them. He considered, however, that actual settlers should not be subjected to the tax.

Mr. CUMBERLAND humourously commented on the extraordinary unanimity between the Government and the leader of the
Opposition, when the subject was that cf
taxing his (Mr. O's.) constituency. He agreed,
however, with the member for Bothwell, that
the lands granted by the Orown in Algoma,
but unccoupied, ought to be taxed.

The motion was agreed to.
