Mr. McKELLAR congratulated the Government on adopting a course which he had all along urged on them. He considered, however, that actual settlers should not be subjected to the tax.

Mr. CUMBERLAND humourously commented on the extraordinary unanimity between the Government and the leader of the Opposition, when the subject was that of taxing his (Mr. O's.) constituency. He agreed, however, with the member for Bothwell, that the lands granted by the Crown in Algoma, but unoccupied, ought to be taxed.

The motion was agreed to.
