OFFICIAL RETURNS.

Hop. Mr. SCOTT brought down returns of all lands sold by the Government, between the 1st of December, 1871, and the present time, to members of this House, or to any flum or company of which any member was a partner; including mineral locations and licenses to cut timber on Crown Lands, also renewals of such licenses.

INEBRIATE ASYLUM,

Hon. Mr. PARDEE rose to move that the House go into Committee to consider a resolution granting a sum of money for the establishment of a hospital for the reclamation and cure of habitual drunkards. In making the motion the hon, gentleman said that before asking the House for this grant it was necessary, for the proper appreciation of the subject, that he should make some general explanations. The question of intemperance had already occupied the attention of the House to a considerable extent during the present ression, as well as that of a large number of persons in the community. Whether or not that arose from the fact that intemperance was on the increase or that the public mind was more interested in the matter, the fact was true at all events. During the present sitting of the Legislature several Bills had been introduced with the view of reducing the evils arising from intemperance. The member for North Norfolk had brought in a measure to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors altogether as a beverage. Whether the House had the power to pass a measure of that kind or not, it was not his province to discuss at the present time. The member for Stormont had a Bill, not for the

probibition of the liquor traffic, but to pre
