One of them wanted him to vote, and suggested that his time would be all right. This was the way he thought Mr. Hellam had mixed up Mr. Tully's name. Mr. Tully then replied that he had done right to use his own judgment in the matter.

Mr. John Wilkie stated that he had been in the employment of the Gov-

Mr. JOHN WILKIE stated that he had been in the employment of the Government for about eleven years at Penetanguishene as master blacksmith, where 120 gates and the same number of ventilators were made. He did not know from whom he received the order to make these gates. He then detailed the circumstances attendant upon his entering into contracts with the Government for the supplying of cell gates, ventilators, etc., for the Central Prison. He gave the particulars of his visit to Sault St. Marie lock-up to repair and alter the gates and ventilators, and state 1 that out of all his transactions he had not made \$1,000. During his examination by Mr. Fraser he said he had acquired a good deal of experience in making and repairing cell doors. It was found that the cost of the gates and ventilators made at Penetanguishene was upwards of 30 cents a pound. The raw material was sent from Toronto, and the manufactured goods were returned. This naturally increased the price of the gates largely, and it was deemed advisable to make them in Toronto. He left Penetanguishene of his own accoord, and applied for a job at the Central Prison works. He was told to send in a tender, and when he did so his tender was accepted. Witness generally corroborated the evidence given by
