AID TO CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS

On the motion of Hon. Mr. FRASER, the House went into Committee on resolutions respecting aid to charitable institutions.

Mr. GOW asked whether it was the intention of the Government to place St. Joseph's Hospital, of Guelph, on Schedule A of the Resolutions relating to Charitable Institutions, so that the institution may also partake of Government aid.

Hon. Mr. FRASER said the Government had come to no decision with regard to this institution. If the hon. member looked at the Bill and the resolutions, he would see that provision was made whereby other institutions than those named in the schedules might, by Order in Council, be considered as named in the schedules, and when the Orders in Council were ratified the institutions would be entitled to receive the aid referred to in the schedule in which it is named. There was also provision made for striking out any of the institutions named in the schedule.

The resolutions were reported, and the report of the Committee adopted.

The resolutions were then referred to the Committee to which the Bill on the same subject was referred.

VOTERS' LISTS.

On the motion of Hon. Mr. MOWAT, the Bill respecting voters' lists was passed through the Municipal Institutions' Bill—Mr. Hodgins in the chair.

After considerable discussion, the Committee rose and reported the Bill with several amendments.

PUBLIC WORKS.

On motion of Hon. Mr. McKELLAR, the House went into Committee on the Bill to amend the Act respecting the Public Works of Ontario—Mr. Baxter in the chair.

The Bill was reported with some amendments, and the report was received, read a third time, and passed.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

The Bill relating to Charitable Institutions was passed through Committee without amendment, reported, read a third time, and passed.

MUNICIPAL DRAINAGE.

The Bill respecting municipal drainage was passed through Committee without amendment, reported, read a third time, and passed.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

The Bill respecting the Executive Council was passed through Committee, reported, read a third time, and passed.

DISTRICT OF NIAGARA.

Hon. Mr. MOWAT said he had given notice of a Bill for the purpose of protecting the section of country in the neighbourhood of Niagara Falls. The extensions upon visitors to the Falls were ~~serious~~ serious, and it was desirable that additional magistrates should be appointed in that district. He had the sanction of His Excellency to say that the resolutions on the subject were recommended to the House.

The resolutions were then referred to

Committee of the Whole and reported. A Bill founded upon the resolutions was then introduced, read a first and second time, referred to Committee, and reported.

Committee of the Whole, and read a third time and passed.

MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

Hon. Mr. CROOKS moved the House into Committee of the Whole on the Bill to amend the municipal institutions in the Province of Ontario. Carried.

The Committee having disposed of a few clauses of the Bill, reported progress, and asked leave to sit again.

PUBLIC ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE.

SATURDAY, March 21.

At the Public Accounts this morning, Mr. David Walker was examined by Mr. Fraser. He stated he was one of the managers of Dr. Jennings' Church. He believed Mr. Wagner was asked what he would construct the fence round that church for, but the managers considering the price too high, invited tenders from other builders. Mr. Wagner's tender was the lowest. Including gates, gate posts, painting and other work on the fence, the cost of the fence was \$1.92 per lineal foot. The tender of Mr. Burt, including everything, was \$2.28 per foot; and Mr. Withrow's tender would have averaged \$2.12 per foot.

By Mr. RYKERT—He had been keeping hotel for about fourteen years, and was proprietor of the American Hotel when the interview took place between Hon. Mr. McKellar and Mr. Lewis. The fence outside was a good one. He had no idea what the price of lumber and pickets was when the fence round Dr. Jennings' Church was built.

Ald. SHEARD, examined by Mr. Fraser, said he had been forty years a builder and contractor. He had seen the fence outside, and the evidence which had been taken before the Committee, and he could give his opinion as to the cost of the fence. He did not think \$1.43 was at all an unreasonable price. The fence was a good substantial one and the Government would, he was sure, get as much value for the money paid on that fence as on any work done.

By Mr. LAUDER—He thought \$1.70 per foot, including painting, would be a fair price, \$1.43 for the carpenter work, and 27 cents for the painting.

By Mr. FRASER—He generally allowed 23 cents per yard for four coats of paint;
