

# ONTARIO LEGISLATURE

## FIRST SESSION—THIRD PARLIAMENT.

**SALE OF LAND IN MUNICIPALITIES.**

Mr. MOWAT introduced a Bill respecting the sale of land in municipalities.

The Bill was passed through the various stages.

### EAST HAWKESBURY.

Mr. DEROCHE stated that in consequence of the opposition offered by the county representatives to the Bill for the division of East Hawkesbury into two municipalities he would withdraw it. The hon. member for Prescott had, however, expressed his confidence that if the Bill were withdrawn, the difficulties between residents of the county which the Bill was introduced to settle would be removed, otherwise that hon. member would not oppose it next year.
