On the motion being drafted and put to the Committee, it was declared carried by a

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on behalf of the Toronto Street Rallway Company, that the only kind of pavement which they objected to was store "block," which was so very expensive that to pave one mile of a double rack with it would cost \$35,000. He then proceeded to speak of the proposal submitted to the Board of Works.

Mr. SHANLY, the City Englacer, on being sked his opinion, said that boulder pavement is considered objectionable save on inclines. Block stone would cost about \$4, wood \$2, benider \$1 10, and cobble 90 cents per square

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The Committee then proceeded to discuss the various sections of the Bill, and passed the compensation clause, to the effect that when the Corporation decides to lay down a new pavement in place of one (not boulder, cobble, or macadam) hereinsfier constructed or paid for by the Company, the Company shall be entitled to the value of the then existing pavement as fixed by arbitrators, the certificate of the City Engineer to decide when a pavement is worn out.
