of Beaumont, He had been told that the Provincial Secretary had been lafermed long before he (Mr. O'Bullivan) had moved in the matter of the non-holding of the inquest. He would like to know to whom Mr Langmuir's instructions to hold an inquest were given, tecause Dr. Riddell presented himself at the prison and was refused permission by the Warden to hold the inquiry. Either the Warden discheyed instructions, never received those instructions. Under similar circumstances it would be easy for officials of the Government to present reports that might cover up the greatest infamy. The law was that it was absolutely necessary to held an inquest on the body of any prisomer who died in gool, and why was an enquiry not held in this case? It was said that the man was buried before the order of the medical efficer was given for an enquiry; but most people would say that it was the duty of the Warden to give this order. An apprepriate report on the eccession would have been "dead men tell no tales." He had been informed that the guards knew of McKelvey's danger, and were asked by him to procure a pricet of his own religion.
