

in Great Britain, and did a considerable amount of good to forward the interests of immigration. He could understand that a special immigration agent would do a great deal of good, and he thought Mr. Hay had done good work.

The item was passed.

SUPPLY.

The House went into Committee of Supply on the vote of \$150,290, increase \$3,186 54, for agriculture, etc.

Mr. ROSS (Huron) stated that he proposed to impose an entrance fee of \$100 upon non-resident pupils instead of \$50 as at present.

The vote passed.

Mr. WOOD questioned the wisdom of the grant of \$10,000 for the Agricultural and Arts Association, and especially the propriety of holding the Provincial Show.

Mr. DRURY stated that all the delegates were in favour of holding the Exhibition.

Mr. BRODER thought that no money was better spent than the money given for holding the Provincial Fair, and asserted that the show had been of immense benefit to the farming community. He would vote for an increase of the amount.

Mr. BALFOUR stated that the farmers of the south-western part of the Province were in favour of increasing the show.

Mr. WATERS contended that though they had a good Central Fair at London, yet they always looked forward to the Provincial Fair.

Mr. GRAHAM, while not in favour of increasing the grant, still he considered the present management of the fair was such as entitled it to be continued.

Mr. CARNEGIE criticised the expenditure on the Provincial Fair.

The item was voted.

The items for maintenance and repairs of Government buildings, \$38,090, increase, \$3,150; public buildings, \$199,259 65; public works, \$49,965—were passed.

This Committee reported, and the House adjourned at 12 o'clock.
