Badgerow as county attorney of York, and commissions were prepared and completed accordingly and bear date 27th December. Before they were forwarded or the gentlemen referred to informed of their appointments, it was decided to stay further action in the and the commissions were not forwarded or acted upon in any way. So far as I am aware the fact of their having been prepared was not known by anyone until I now state it here, except by those who have officially something to do with the preparation or authentication of the commissions.
