ganization, has received a communication professing to speak for the manufacturers of Toronto and of different parts of the Province, asking for a meeting for mutual consultation. Mr. Awrey, secretary of the club, has replied, fixing the consultation for Tuesday at ten o'clock, in the reception-room of the Assembly. It is supposed the manufacturers desire to consult the farmers as to legislation before the House, and especially as to that effecting conditional sales of chattels and sales under hire receipts.

THE POLICY IN DANGER:—Mr. Mowat has intimated that the Government will oppose Mr. Meredith's motion for a select committee to consider the best means for the conservation of the timber and the development of the mines of the Province.

THE CONFERENCE DEBATE:—In reply to Mr. Meredith, the Attorney-General announced that the debate on the resolutions of the Inter-Provincial Conference will probably begin on Thursday next.

An Investigation Wanted:—It is understood Mr. John McLay, ex-registrar of Bruce, who was dismissed from office on the evidence brought out by a Government Commission, will ask for a Parliamentary committee to investigate his case.

Public Accounts:—The Public Accounts Committee met in the morning and elected Mr. Clarke, of Wellington, as chairman. Mr. Meredith was not present, so that no course was mapped out as to his suggested investigation of the irregularities in the Treasury Department mentioned by the Provincial Treasurer in his Budget speech. The probability, however, is that this investigation will be entered upon next week.
