The Board may pass by-laws defining limits within which livery stables must not be established or horses kept for hire. Power given to the City Council, if they deem just, to tax the cost of sewers, bridges and streets upon the "land benefited" instead upon the lands fronting upon such improvements.

SCOTT ACT FINES:—A return brought down by Mr. Hardy shows that last year \$93,211 was received for Scott Act fines in counties and \$31,466 in cities and towns. Middlesex received the largest amount of any single county—\$10,094; Northumberland and Durham received \$7,001; Port Hope \$2,921 and Cobourg \$1,500. The sum of \$10,150 was collected in the Town of Peterboro'. The amount collected in Halton was only \$1,302.
