

A deputation from the Builder's Laborers' Union, consisting of W. D. Davidge, chairman; Thos. R. Houghton, secretary; H. Benson, G. H. Potter, C. Chapman, A. Roberts and T. Webb, waited on the Attorney-General after the House had risen and presented him with an address from the body named in favor of the six hundred dollar exemption. The usual arguments were presented to show that the law as it stands at present favors the speculator and the land grabber, and bears heavily on such classes as the deputation represented.

Messrs. Lyon and Conmee introduced to the Minister of Education in the afternoon a deputation from the Town of Sault Ste. Marie composed of Mayor Biggings, Mayor Hamilton and Mr. D. J. Graham. They urged the Minister to establish a High school in the town and to give it special assistance until it should come to be self-sustaining. They represented that the district was without a High school, and that it was growing to be a place of considerable importance. Mr. Ross promised to render ever practical assistance to the cause of education in Algoma.

The Attorney-General's two bills regarding the Land Titles Act and the registry merely simplifies the procedure, there being no radical change proposed.

Mr. Robert Boston, the good-looking bachelor brother-in-law of the Minister of Education, was on the floor of the House. Mr. Boston is quite a magnate when he is at home, being Reeve of Lobo and Warden of Middlesex, but he bears the mark of a man of ability wherever you see him. He will be in the city for a few days yet.

The Attorney-General's bill, dealing with companies having limited liabilities, is analogous in its provisions to the English Act governing such institutions. It enacts that when a company is incorporated with a limited liability this information must in every case be written after the name and title of the company.
