The Premier of Ontario was given in Room No. 16 of the Parliament buildings a tangible testimony of the regard and esteem in which he is held by his colleagues and supporters in the Assembly. He has been the hero of many victories at the polls and in the Courts, he has led his party with unparalleled success for nearly a score of years, and in administering the affairs of his native Province he has been always found true to the right, and the stern foe of compromise and political trickery. The Province is proud of his attainments, the Liberals follow him with a devotion rarely extended to a leader, and their representatives in the Legislature yesterday therefore met the Attorney-General, and in the presence of members his family and a few Conservatives in the Assembly, presented with a magnificent life-sized oil painting of himself.
