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of correction, reformatories, etc. It consisted of J. W. Langmuir, Hon. C. Drury, Hon. T. W. Angfin, Dr. A. M. Rosebrugh and A. F. Jury. The commissioners received in all \$5,616, and the cests were \$3,818 56.

The eighth paid commission since Confederation, the 80th in all, was appointed to inquire in-November 13th, 1890, commis-The laws. game to the Lucas, R. G. R. A. sioners were Harvey, J. H. Wilmott, G. A. McCallum, W. S. Pulford, John Mitchell, A. H. Taylor, Edward Thompson, H. K. Smith and A. Stewart. The commissioners received for their services \$3,892 55.

The 9th paid commission, the 83rd in all, was appointed August 19, 1891, re Township of Proton. The commissioners were Hon. T. W. Anglin and Mr. Emilius Irving. The commissioners received \$160

and the costs were \$10 38.

The tenth paid commission, the 84th in all, was appointed September 2, 1891, re working of the drainage laws. The commissioners were Messrs. J. B. Rankin, W. McGeorge, R. Lamarsh and A. McIntyre. The commissioners received \$3,400, and the costs were \$3,628 49.

The eleventh paid commission, the 36th in all, was appointed February 29, 1892, to inquire into charges against David Ross, accountant in the Crown Lands Department. The commissioners received

\$104; there were no costs.

The twelfth and last paid commission, the 88th in all, was appointed March 9th, 1892, re dehorning of cattle. The commissioners were Hon. C. Drury, J. J. Kelso, R. Gibson, D. M. McPherson, A. Smith, Henry Clendinning. The commissioners received \$1,780 95, and the costs were \$699.

## THE COST OF THE HOSPITALS.

Inspector Chamberlain's report on the hospitals of Ontario, the 24th issued, exhibits a marked improvement in their efficiency, management and sanitary condition as compared with previous years. There seems increased confidence in them, he reports, on the part of the public, and constant improvements are going on. The staffs of medical men and nurses are constantly becoming larger and more experienced. During the year four new hospitals, viz., St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto; Amasa Wood Hospital, St. Thomas ; General and Marine Hospital, Owen Sound, and General Protestant Hospital, Chatham, have made application to be placed on the list of institutions receiving Government aid. The total number of hospitals now receiving Government aid is 32. Three new hospitals have been placed on the list this year, and the legislative grant is thus somewhat increased. Notwithstanding this increase the deaths in the hospitals for 1893 were 27 less than in 1892, being 731 as opposed to 758. The number remaining under treatment on September 30, 1893, was 1,107 as against 965 in 1892, and 10,554 were discharged in 1893. The death rate is exceedingly small, 16.95 per cent., being very little higher than in 1891, which year saw the minimum death rate.

The total grant asked for is \$107,312 13, being \$7,970 34 in excess of the grant for 1892. The summary per hospital is:

The average daily cost per patient is 84.55 cents, as opposed to 79.31 cents in 1892, and of this the Government share is 36.73 cents, as against 30.93 cents in 1892. The reports of the separate hospitals give full details as to their expenses and workings.

## MR. ALEX. M'LAREN'S FINANCIAL RELATIONS.

A return was presented on the motion of Mr. Miscampbell showing "the amount due in the year '89 by Alexander McLaren for dues on timber cut on the berth in the Township of Wilberforce, of which he was licensee, and of the amount accepted in payment of his indebtedness and of copies of all correspondence with reference to such indebtedness and the settlement of it, and of all reports by any officer of the department in reference thereto, and as to the quantity of timber cut by the licensee, and as to the value of the license." From the return it appears that in 1889 the amount owing by Mr. McLaren for dues on timber cut on the berth named was \$3,704 12, interest on which, at 7 per cent. made the indebtedness \$4,141 55. Besides this there was a balance of \$2,600 on notes for \$5,060 given by Mr. McLaren in purchase of the limit from former licensee, and which were assigned to the department. The interest on this sure amounted to \$1,715. Mr. McLaren's total liabilities in this respect, therefore, in the year named, were \$8,456 55. Mr. McLaren being unable to meet his liabilities, he paid, after investigation, and there was accepted as a settlement in full, the sum of \$4,313 62. The correspondence on the subject is very voluminous and not of special public interest. It was as early as September 7, 1887, that Mr. Aubrey, while Deputy Commissioner of Crown Lands, began pressing Mr. McLaren th reduced his liabilities to the Government Mr. McLaren, after several requests to the same effect, wrote that he was in an uncial straits, that his assets were but

\$29,398 08 against liabilities of \$42.074 89. His heaviest creditors were J. K. Post & Co. of Oswego and the Government, though tere were a good many others. It was h.s timber business particularly on which he had lost money. The Oswego firm had a mortgage on his mill and a chattel mortgage on his Tumber and logs; on what was cut and what might be cut. If he made an assignment, the Oswego firm would be pretty well secured and the other creditors would fa very badly, including the Government suggested, therefore, a compromis asked the department to take \$2,500 as a settlement in full of his liabilities. He would then endeavor to settle with Post & Co. on a similar basis, and all his creditors would get something. The Deputy Commissioner, after satisfying himself by a special investigation that Mr. McLaren's account of his financial condition was about correct, offered to compromise for \$5,000. Mr. McLaren endeavored to come to this figure, which he, however, objected was very high, but subsequently found himself unable to do so. Mr. White, meantime, had learned that Mr. McLaren's condition was even worse than he had himself represented, and, after a close inquiry into the affair and numerous exchanges of telegrams and letters, effected a compromise on the basis given in the above figures.

## THE ASSESSMENT OF GAS COMPANIES.

At 4 o'clock a deputation from St. Thomas called upon the Premier and was received in Sir Oliver's private office. Mr. Hardy and Mr. Ross were also present. The deputation, which was introduced by Mr. D. McColl, M.PP., consisted of Mayor G. L. Oill, Ald. and ex-Mayor R. McCully, City Solicitor G. M. Glenn, and Clerk and Treasurer S. O. Perry.
