Want Additional Accommodation.

This afternoon a deputation composed of Messrs. R. F. Holterman, Brantford; Elmer Lick, Oshawa; Nelson Monteith, M.P.P.; J. B. Reynolds, Ontario Agricultural Farm, and C. A. Zavitz, experimentalist at the Agricultural College, waited upon the Government to ask that \$16,000 be inserted in the supplementary estimates for the purpose of providing a new building at the Ontario Agricultural College. The deputation urged that increased residence accommodation is needed, there being 145 students enrolled, while there is only accommodation for 120, and three or four students are assigned to some of the larger rooms. To provide this accommodation it was suggested that the enlarging of the residence can be accomplished by removing the library and museum from the main to a separate building. The growth of the teaching departments makes more room necessary for the departments of physics, biology and horticulture. Suitable library accommodation is also required, and it was suggested that a new building would be sufficient to accommodate all these departments and provide a hall for the meetings of the College Literary Society and Experimental Union.

Public Health Act.

Yesterday evening the Legislative Committee of the Provincial Board of Health waited upon the Provincial Secretary to urge the necessity for an improvement in the present law respecting the appointment of Medical Health Officers. Dr. Macdonald, Hamilton, Chairman of the board; Dr. Cassidy and Dr. Bryce, who formed the deputation, were accompanied by Dr. McKay, M.P.P., South Oxford. The deputation urged that, owing to the necessary scientific character of the work of preventive medicine and the limited means at the disposal of rural municipalities it was impossible to have the work properly attended to. They asked that the permissive clause of the act of 1891 providing for County Health Officers be made compulsory, and that officers specially qualified in State medicine be appointed for the same districts as County School Inspectors, to give their whole time to the public health work.

Dr. McKay urged that such an arrangement would relieve the smaller municipalities, and Dr. Bryce pointed out that such officers might be utilized in connection with the official certification of meat products for export.

Public Accounts.

The Public Accounts Committee met yesterday morning and re-elected Mr. W. A. Charlton Chairman, on motion of Hon. R. Harcourt, seconded by Mr. Wardell. Mr. Wardell asked for all the vouchers in connection with colonization roads expenditure in 1898, and Mr. Carnegie for all the vouchers in connection with the Western Dairy School.

The committee ordered that the vouchers be produced, and adjourned until Tuesday morning.

Want Their Own Judge.

Mr. C. F. Farwell yesterday morning introduced a deputation comprised of Messrs. Jackson, Cashman and McKissock of Gore Bay, Manitoulin Island, to the Attorney-General. The object of the visit was to ask the Government to divide the Algoma district for judicial purposes, and to create a new territorial judicial district for Manitoulin Island. There are at present two Judges at Sault Ste. Marie, Manitoulin Island being in their district. The deputation proposes that the Junior Judge be removed to Gore Bay, and the district divided, in order that the expense of time and money in proceeding from Sault Ste. Marie to the island may be saved. There will not, they argue, be any additional cost, but the convenience of the islanders would be met.

The Printing Committee met and organized this afternoon. Mr. J. R. Stratton was re-elected Chairman.
