The banquet tendered last evening by the Opposition members of the Legislature to their leader, Mr. J. P. Whitney, while not revealing any new features of the party programme, was a great success from the standpoint of enthusiasm and good-fellowship. The company was made up largely of the Parliamentary delegation and the Presidents and Secretaries of Conservative associations and candidates for the Legislature throughout the Province, and numbered nearly four hundred. In addition to the guest of the evening, there were such prominent speakers as Mr. R., L. Borden, the Dominion Conservative leader, and Mr. F. D. Monk, M.P., the Conservative leader in Quebec, who came up to say a word of cheer to those about to enter upon the Provincial campaign. Mr. Whitney's speech contained a recital of his attitude toward Provincial issues, similar to those of his former speeches. All three speakers alluded in a long-range manner to the prohibition question, their attitude, succinctly stated, being of non-interference in what they considered to be a perplexing situation in which Premier Ross found himself.
