such a course. The first thing they would have to ask for would be a water front, and they ought to get

Mr. Crawford (W. Toronto) acquiesced in the view taken by the Attorney-General. There was no property that would be affected by the purchasing of the property, even if a part of it were used for an extension of the cattle market.

Col. Gibson told Mr. Crawford not to spoil a good speech by reference to cattle markets, and the latter wise-

ly resumed his seat.

A number of over-burdened taxpayers and others presented some

further objections.

The provision was passed subject to a two-thirds vote of the Council and to a stipulation that the property be used for park or exhibition purposes.

This was the last matter that the committee had to discuss, and they

adjourned for the session.
