Outside Their Jurisdiction.

This resolution sought to advise the Federal Government to do something beyond the control of the Legislature. They might as well pass a tariff resolution.

HANNA HAS NO APOLOGY FOR SNIDER'S CONDUCT

LAUDS OFFICER WHO TOOK PART IN SCOTT ACT CAM-PAIGNS.

During a discussion of the estimates in the Legislature late last evening Hon. Mr. Hanna gave the House his promised statement in regard to the part played by License Inspector W. K. Snider in the recent Scott act campaigns in Welland, Peel and Huron counties. Mr. Hanna concluded his statement as follows:—
