The Company Tax.

When the corporation tax bill was going through committee an amendment was introduced increasing the direct tax from \$25,000 to \$30,000. This was done to make sure that the rate would be equal to or greater than the amount of 1% per cent. on the gross income of the companies. The restriction upon the amount of refund was removed in order that the Provincial Treasurer might make a refund promptly. This was done to assist fire insurance companies that did a great deal of reinsuring, and would be inconvenienced if the minimum rate was fixed on gross premtums. The clause placing a fivecents-per-hundred-mile tax on parlor and sleeping and dining cars was dropped.

The bulk sales act, which has been a hardy annual for many years, was withdrawn, the redrafted bill coming in too late for consideration.
