Will. Enfranchise Ontario Her Soldiers

BILL IN LEGISLATURE

Tributes Paid by Members to Good Qualities of Late Hon. J. J. Foy and Hon. J. S. Duff-New Government Bills.

A measure will be passed by the Legislative Assembly of Ontario during the present session providing for the enfranchisement of soldiers. Hon. T. W. McGarry, who introduced the bill yesterday, explained that it is intended to meet the case of every man from Ontario who has enlisted with the British or allied naval or military forces. "Every male British subject, whether he has attained the age of twenty-one years or not, will be entitled to vote," said Mr. Mc-Garry, "on the assumption that a man who is old enough to fight is old mark of his skill as a legal man. enough to vote." The announcement was greeted by general applause.

In reply to a question by Mr. Rowell as to when the report of the Nickel Commission would be ready, Hon. Mr. Ferguson said the Chairman of the Commission had been ailing for some two months and the report had been delayed. They expected it would be ready, however, in the course of ten days or two weeks.

In moving the first reading of a bill affecting the Department of Agriculture. Sir William Hearst explained that the object of the measure was to provide for the appointment of a Commissioner of Agriculture, to define his duties, and to make permissible the appointment of the two Deputy Ministers.

Farmers' Co-operative Societies.

The Premier also introduced a bill which has for its object the incorporation of farmers' co-operative societies in the form of an amendment to the Ontario companies act. legislation was to permit of the more easy organization of farmers' societies. Sir William mentioned that there were in the Province seventy fruit-growers' organizations, sixty egg circles, fifteen vegetable growers' associations, seven seed associations, twenty breeders' clubs, and a number of other organizations. To indicate the importance of these associations, the Premier mentioned that last year the fruit growers had sold produce to the value of \$442,000; fourteen egg circles had sold \$111,000 worth of eggs, and nine rural organizations had handled \$145,000 worth of produce.
