EVENING PAPER REPORT DENIED

Story Alleging Split in Liberal Ranks Brings Hot Reply Two Liberal members in the Legis-

lature yesterday took occasion to protest against a story published in an evening newspaper that the Liberal party was "disintegrating." The article in question stated that H. H. Dewart, the Liberal Leader, was losing his hold on members, and that the party was splitting.

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Wellington Hay, Liberal Whip, brought the article up in the Legislature yesterday before the orders of the day were called. He said that the article was written evidently with a malicious intention. "The member for Southwest Toronto," he said, "was chosen as Leader of the Liberal party and my leader last year. I am still in that position today." (Applause from Liberal members.)

Mr. R. R. Hall, Parry Sound, rose to protest against what he called a most scurrilous and entirely unwarranted article that had appeared in an evening paper of Tuesday. "The article is altogether untrue, is out of order, and is a libel on all the names mentioned," said the Parry Sound man.
