KEEN TO KNOW WHAT IS DOING

Premier Doesn't Want Hydro Committee to Be "on Its Own"

DETAILS WILL FOLLOW

"The Government has no intention of turning a committee loose to investigate Chippawa without knowing just what direction that committee will take," declared Premier Drury in the Legislature yesterday, replying to Hon. G. H. Ferguson's request for information as to when the matter of Chippawa investigation was to be taken up. "I quite agree with the honorable member (Mr. Ferguson) as to the need of investigation," he said, "and I would ask him to believe the Government has the matter well in hand."

Premier Drury explained that his motion standing on the order paper for the appointment of a select committee constituted really a blanket motion, and would be withdrawn and presented in more detail when the duties of the committee were delineated.

Hon. Mr. Ferguson thought that the seriousness of the statements of Hon. D. Carmichael warranted prompt investigation. He took issue with the verbiage of the Premier's motion, which set forth that the select committee was to investigate certain matters "which may be referred to that committee from time to time by this House."

Said the Conservative Leader: "That is not the matter which the Prime Minister promised. We were to undertake to investigate the truth of certain allegations, made not only by the Minister without portfolio, but afterwards reiterated by the Prime Minister himself, that mis-statements of fact had been made by those who were responsible for the estimates."
